C., the number attending at Chipman is very gratifying, although it is smaller than that of last year. The camp dates are July 23 to August 2, and visitors' day at the camp will be July 28.

SHOE OUTPUT DECREASES. OTTAWA, July 7.—Canadian factories made 1,352,720 pairs of boots and shoes in May, 1926, a decrease of about 75,000 pairs from April's output. The decrease is chiefly due to strikes in the Quebec factories, says a statement from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.
