

If there is a general settlement of inter-Allied debts, he said, the centre of gravity of the reparation problem will be shifted. Great Britain preposes to pay all she receives and all she may receive from France, Italy and Germany to the United States.

France, Italy and Belgium have debts to settle with the United States. The upshot of all these transactions is that Great Britain, France, Belgium and Italy are either partly or entirely intermediaries between Germany and the United States.
