

## CHAMBERLAIN IS MENTIONED FOR GARTER REWARD

Signal Honor Reported Coming for Good Work at Locarno

NOTICE WITHHELD FOR FINAL ACTION

LONDON, Nov. 5.—I learn that the King is desirous of showing Austen Chamberlain some signal honor for his services at Locarno, but the announcement is being withheld until the various governments have agreed and the pact is "un fait accompli." There are those who say the Foreign Secretary will be rewarded with the Garter and there is little doubt such will be the eventual honor, though an influential member of the Government tells me he would not be at all surprised if a marquisate were given him. It is known that the Chamberlain family, with their long connection with Birmingham, would be proud to have a title connecting them with that great city.

MR. BALDWIN'S MANTLE

If Mr. Chamberlain accepted a peerage the Foreign Secretaryship would be back in the House of Lords once more. It is an arrangement most formidably ministers have found convenient, it removes them from the hurly-burly of the Commons with its heckling and its weakness for asking ignorant and inconvenient questions. Nevertheless his transfer to the upper chamber would almost certainly be construed as an indication that Mr. Chamberlain had definitely abandoned all ambition of ever succeeding Mr. Baldwin in the Premiership. The way would be open to Mr. Churchill, who might accept a Garter, but will assuredly not go to the Lords even if it reduces income tax to a shilling in the pound.

CONTRASTS

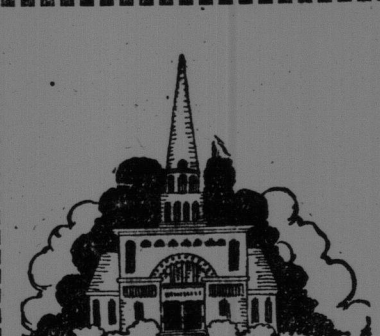

**TODAY IN MARKET**  
Poultry in Good Supply—Eggs a Bit Scarce—Retail Prices

There was a good supply of poultry at fairly steady prices with better demand at this morning's market. Chickens were 40 to 45 cents, fowl 30 to 35 cents. Dairy butter brought from 48 to 50 cents while creamery commanded 55 cents.

Native produce in vegetables was a little more scarce but the supply of cants, geese 45 cents, turkeys 45 to 50, vegetables all around was still good.

Celery sold at from 12 to 15 cents; lettuce 10 cents; squash, 5 cents a pound; pumpkins, 3 cents a pound; cabbage, 3 cents a pound, while cauliflower, tomatoes and cucumbers were obtainable only at somewhat higher prices than last week.

Several new members were elected and it was announced that it was hoped to have a visit from Premier Rhodes, of Nova Scotia early in the new year. It was also reported that it was expected there would be joint meetings with the Saint John branch of the Engineering Institute of Canada during the winter.
