"LITTLE EVA" IS ARRESTED FOR HOLDING SEANCE

Three Others Besides Reput-
ed Medium Held at First
Spiritualist Church.

New York, May 17.—"Little Eva,"
reputed medium, and three other per-
sons were arrested before Magistrate
Charles A. Oberwager in Night Court
on charges of disorderly conduct and
"uninstalling a place of seance," and
were released in \$1,000 bail each for ex-
amination in West Side Court. The
four defendants said they were members
of the First Spiritualist Church of New
York.

All was dark in the church on the
second floor of a house in West 125th
street, near West End avenue, when
two men and a woman, strangers,
paid their \$2 entrance fee and took back
seats. There were about fourteen or
fifteen others in the room, at the front
of which was a stage and curtain.
The three late arrivals were Detective
William Blake, Andrew McLaughlin, and
Genevieve McLaughlin.

The detective said the Rev. Dr. Wil-
liam R. Thompson warned all present to
make no noise or stir, and not to touch
the spirit when it materialized, since the
medium might die from shock. Then a
shadowy form appeared behind the cur-
tain on the stage, according to the de-
tectives, and Dr. Thompson said:
"The spirit is with you. Does any one
recognize the spirit as one who has
departed?"

Mrs. McLaughlin answered:
"It is that you, Benjamin!"
"Yes," came the voice from behind
the curtain. Then "Is Bob with you
—your husband, or are you alone?"
"Yes, Auntie, Bob is here," said Mc-
Laughlin.

Just as the spirit intoned, "You are
looking well, dear," McLaughlin said
he sprang for the spirit and detected
a gully in his dress.

There were screams, for the detective's
heavy boot had trod on the medium's
bare feet and all was confusion in the
church. Most of those present managed
to escape this hasty flight, and by the
time the detectives turned on the lights
they found they had only three prisoners
besides the medium, who gave her name
as Mrs. Eva Thompson of 125 Market
street, Evanville, O. These were the
Rev. Dr. Thompson, said to be the
medium's husband, Mrs. Anna Herman
of 282 West Seventeenth street, forty-four
years old, and Miss Alice Mortimer of
58 Haverhill street, Brooklyn, forty
years old.

**\$6,000 IN RARE COINS
AND STAMPS STOLEN**
New York, May 17.—The Elsie Stamp
Co., 1409 Broadway, announced yester-
day that it has been robbed of rare
stamps and coins valued at more than
\$6,000. The thief was described as a
man about thirty years old, believed to
be a Scandinavian, who represents him-
self as a collector of stamps. The an-
nouncement says that the thief fre-
quents the offices of stamp dealers, buys
\$5 or \$10 worth of goods, offers some
expensive stamps for sale, and then dis-
appears with his loot.

The theft from the Elsie concern took
place in its office between May 2 and
May 7, but was not discovered until
later.

TO DIE IN CHAIR AT 65.
Oldest Man Ever Condemned in New
York Loses Appeal.

Ostling, May 17 Michael Rossi, a
death-house prisoner aged 65, wept when
informed by Sing Sing attendants that
they received written notice from Al-
bany that the Court of Appeals had just
denied him a new trial. He will be put
to death June 26.

Unless Governor Miller commutes his
death sentence, Rossi will be the oldest
person ever executed in New York State.
He was convicted of killing Antonio
Orlando in Tuckahoe. He pleaded self-
defence. His counsel, James Dempsey,
of Peekskill, is planning to get up a pe-
tition to the governor to save Rossi. He
has been in the death house two years
and one month. "I do not deserve this,"
Rossi said when told the high court had
just decreed that he must die.

**Canadian Pacific Train Service
Daylight Time**

At 12:01 a. m., Sunday, May 21st, all
city clocks will be advanced one hour
to conform with Daylight Time.

This means that new daylight saving
time will be one hour faster than At-
lantic Standard and two hours faster
than Eastern Standard Time; Canadian
Pacific trains are all operated under the
latter.

Effective May 22nd practically full
Suburban Service will be re-established.
Times of trains adjusted to meet re-
quirements account of daylight as
follows—

daily except Sunday, and on Wednesdays

8:15 p. m. and 8:30 p. m., daily except

July 1st, noon suburban at 11:20 a. m.

All other trains will arrive and depart
on schedule effective April 30th.

Effective Sunday, June 4th, and on
Sundays until further notice, new train
service between St. John and Fredericton
will be established, leaving St. John at
8:10 a. m., arrive Fredericton 10:30 a. m.,
returning leave Fredericton 9:30 p. m.,
arrive St. John 6:05 p. m.

CRIME WAVE FILLS PRISONS.

Sing Sing, Auburn and Clinton Now
Crowded With Convicts.

Ostling, May 17—Representatives
of the State Prison Department reported
at Sing Sing that there has been a large
increase in the population of the State
Prison in the last six months. Sing
Sing, Auburn and Clinton Prisons have
filled up and there is a large increase
also at Great Meadow Prison. There are
now about 1,200 prisoners in Sing Sing,
and several drafts of convicts have been
sent from there to up-state prisons in
six months. There are 1,800 prisoners in
Auburn; 1,400 in Clinton prison and 800
in Great Meadow.

Crime waves around Greater New
York, Erie and Monroe counties are re-
sponsible for the big gain in prison popu-
lation.

SAYS GERMANS NEED THE KAISER AGAIN

Ludendorff's View is That They Re-
quire an Autocratic Dictatorship

London, May 17.—In order to regain
its old position in the world, Germany
needs the Kaiser again, says Ludendorff
in an article in the Sunday Pictorial.
He continues:

"Our enemies are still glaring at the
stern, self-controlled Prussian spirit and
will not recognize the danger that would
arise if the Bolshevik mind were to re-
place the nationalist mind among the
German people."

"What the German people require in
the near future is autocratic dictat-
orship. German dictators have character
and unqualified preference to monarchy."

FRENCH PAPERS ON QUEBEC PROGRESS

La Patrie: On the occasion of the
twenty-fifth anniversary of the Liberal
party's accession to power in the
province of Quebec, the Hon. Mr. Tache-
man has made a brief inventory of the
progress accomplished here during that
period. The description of the mater-
ial prosperity which has been firmly
established during that relatively short
period may well inspire us with legiti-
mate pride. We have increased our
wealth, and as a result the people's well-
fare and happiness has grown propor-
tionately. But the material progress
would have been in vain if it had not
served at the same time to elevate the
moral standards of the people, and it
is in this respect that the inventory
made after the passing of twenty-five
years, marks fruitful and imperishable
progress. As the wealth of the pro-
vince has increased, we have enhanced
the intellectual status of the people by
perfecting our means of education, and
the whole system of public instruction.
We have by gradual reforms virtually
banished the plague of alcoholism and
organized on a strong foundation a sys-
tem of defence against disease, notably
by spreading a knowledge of the laws
of health and equipping anti-tubercu-
losis hospitals. We have likewise over-
come a vigorous defence against poverty
by providing adequate resources for
works of public assistance. Today Que-
bec occupies a position envied by the
other provinces, and may face the future
with serenity.

La Presse, commenting on Quebec's
progress, says: "It is often said that
too much prosperity is harmful to the
head. This may be true in regard to
provinces as to individuals. It behooves
us, therefore, to know how to profit by
our advantages without abusing them.
Let us utilize our moral energies, our

economic forces and our natural re-
sources to the best purpose, marking the
goal we wish to attain and working un-
ceasingly to reach it by a united effort
on the part of the Quebec community.
Let us remember that if our position
is one admired by the other provinces,
efforts will be made to rival it if not
to outdistance it, if possible. It is our
duty, therefore, as a community to work
together to assure the continued superi-
ority of Quebec by practicing the vir-
tues and employing the means of ac-
tivity which have brought us such suc-
cess in the past."

STRANGE SCOTTISH WILL.

Askes of Body to Fertilize Potatoes.

London, April 21.—(By mail.)—The
will of an ex-schoolmaster and science
teacher named James Campbell Christie
of Kilmaling street, Cathcart, Glasgow,
who left £2,440, contains the following
clauses—

He bequeathed his personal clothing
and bed-clothes to the old men and
women's home, Glasgow, and if not ac-
cepted, to the Charity Organisation
Society, or to any really necessitous or
deserving persons whose circumstances
were well known to any of his trustees,
with a strong preference in favor of total
abstainers, non-smokers, and unbelievers
in any religion. People who wasted or
had wasted money in alcohol and to-
bacco did not deserve charitable assist-
ance. He wished the strictest simplicity
to be observed in his funeral; no hearse
to be used, but a plain carriage with a
box underneath, or any simpler or less
expensive way of conveying his body to
the crematorium (where he had paid the
cremation fee in advance in 1907). He
wished no one to waste time by attend-
ing his funeral, and desired that his
ashes should not be preserved, but dis-
posed of by the crematorium or "used by
any of his trustees or others to fertilize
their potatoes."
