The Fear of Champion.

Paris, July 2.—(Associated Press by mail)—Andre Gobert, who held the French tennis championship for several years until defeated by Jean Sanaoullou of Bordeaux last May, served during the war as an aviator and was recuperating at Vichy from shock received in a fall of more than 1,000 feet while in 1917 when some of the neutrals enjoying the cure organized a tennis tournament. Gobert entered under the name Duick. Not being in the best of shape he had a hectic time in reaching the semi-finals where he had to meet a youthful Dane who was going great guns. Gobert lost the first set six to two and was in a fair way of losing the second when some one in the crowd recognized the French champion and commenced shouting encouragement to him.
