A case against Wallace Stevens, who was charged with driving a car for business purposes without a city license, was resumed in the police court today. He agreed to get a city license and a settlement was reached. E. S. Ritchie appeared for the defendant.

SALE OF UNMARKED LOGS
As a result of an auction held this morning in the rooms of the board of trade, Stetson, Cutler & Co. will take over all the unmarked logs of spruce, cedar and pine picked up during the season. The hemlock was bid in by Randolph & Baker. Most of the lumber dealers of the city were present.

VISITING SOLDIER
Sydney Laidlaw who has been overseas for the last four years with a medical unit, is visiting the city as the guest of his cousin, Mrs. G. R. Boutiller, Orange street. He arrived yesterday from Halifax. Mr. Laidlaw is in Vancouver and will leave for his home in a few days.

BACK IN ENGLAND
A cablegram was received yesterday by S. McConnell of the board of health stating that his son, Robert S. McConnell, saying he had arrived in England from Archangel. He had been formerly with the 10th Signal Battalion. He is now with the 87th. His friends will be glad to hear that he is a further stage towards his return home. Mr. McConnell is now at Ripon.

WAS IN BIG BATTLES
Pte. George Demmer, son of Jefferson Demmer of 104 Britain street, was among the soldiers who arrived home yesterday. **T. M. BURNS RESIGNS
CATHEDRAL POST**

Has Been 12 Years Successful
Agent of Bishop — J. Joseph
Mitchell Successor

After twelve years of service as agent for the Bishop of St. John, Thomas M. Burns has resigned. He will be succeeded by J. Joseph Mitchell. Pressure of his duties as secretary of the board of health with its increased activities has caused Mr. Burns to give up the post. During his tenure of office he has given entire satisfaction in his dealings in behalf of the bishop both in property and church work and has capably managed the several properties. In this he has been ably assisted by John O'Neill, who also is resigning.

Mr. Burns succeeded John P. Gleason in office during the time of Archbishop Casey and was continued in the post by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc who has accepted his resignation with regret. Mitchell will officially take over the duties on July 1.

DEMPEY 24 YEARS OLD TODAY

Toledo, June 24.—Jack Dempsey, challenger for the world's heavyweight championship, will celebrate his twenty-fourth birthday today exchanging punches with his sparring partners in preparation for his title contest with Jess Willard. The challenger received a score of greetings from admirers. Willard planned to resume boxing to-day after yesterday's lay off.

PAY \$80 OR GO TO JAIL FOR 10 MONTHS

**Magistrate Says Langford Coran
Would be Whipped if Law
Permitted**

In the police court this morning four men were charged with drunkenness. The cause of their becoming intoxicated was lemon extract.

The magistrate called attention of the police to an incident that happened last night. He said he was called to his house telephone and a voice said, "Have we any policemen?" The magistrate said that in order to see for himself he went down to Union street and saw a broad-shouldered man who lives in the city in company with a man who got out of jail recently and they were also in company with a "bum" who lived in City road. These men were interfering with the traffic in the street and the magistrate said: "I looked for a policeman but could not see any." He continued by saying that he took on his own shoulders the police duty and moved these men along.

The magistrate said that he hoped the same thing would not happen in St. John again, that he would not have to be called from his home by citizens to move people from the street.

Langford Coran was charged with assaulting Policeman Thomas. The policeman said he was called to 108 Canterbury street. I went to the door of Coran's residence, found it open and went in. Being met by Mrs. Coran, she said she did not want to have her husband put under arrest. All she wanted was the protection of the police while she dressed herself and baby so she could leave the premises. She told the policeman that her husband had been abusing her and her baby. At this, the policeman said, the defendant made a rush at him and he put him under arrest on assault charges.

Mrs. Coran gave evidence that about 5 o'clock her husband came downstairs and was angry because he was not called to work. He was to go to work at 6 o'clock in the sugar refinery. She said she told him sugar was on the table. He told her to get under the influence of lemon extract and he caught her and tried to choke her, making marks on her eye and neck, hit her in the mouth with his closed fist, breaking one of her teeth. She said he then grabbed the baby out of her arms and threw it on the sofa.

The defendant was kind and his wife said it was probably due to the police having to use some force in arresting him. He was a vile, vicious man. Coran was fined \$80 or ten months in jail. The magistrate said if there was a provision in the law whereby a man could be whipped this man would certainly receive the full penalty of the law for ill-treating his wife and child.

**SUMMON JURY
FOR HAYES CASE**

Circuit Court This Morning Ad-
journed Until July 22

The June sitting of the Supreme Court Circuit opened this morning with His Honor Justice Crockett presiding. There was no grand jury summoned and no criminal cases were taken up. On the application of Daniel Mullin, K. C., who appeared on behalf of Jack Hayes, recently acquitted for trial on the charge of assaulting Sheriff Wilson, His Honor made an order directing Coroner Kenney to summon a grand jury and an additional petit jury for July 22 when the court will meet again. The order was directed to Coroner Kenney as the sheriff is an interested party, being the complainant, and therefore had not the jurisdiction to summon the jury. Court was adjourned until July 22 at 10 a. m. when the case of the King vs Hayes will be taken up and the other civil jury causes entered on the docket.

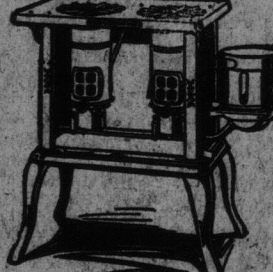
