**GERMAN PEACE TERMS
AMAZE THE ALLIES**

With the French Army in France,
Wednesday night, May 16—(By the
Associated Press, Delayed)—Germany's
conditions of peace are clearly stated in
a document found in a German trench
that was recently re-captured by Entente
Allied troops.

A resume of the principal conditions,
as given in an official translation, reads:
"After the enormous sacrifices we have
made of our blood and property we ex-
pect as a necessary minimum to the pre-
servation and development of Germany
the following:

"Our colonies shall be returned with-
out augmentation.
"We are to have more numerous and
stronger naval stations.
"The Longwy and Briey minefields,
which furnished France with weapons for
attack, shall become German.
"Readjustments of the frontiers, par-
ticularly in the Vosges, to be made
according to the military situation and
the appreciation of the commandant. Our
frontiers must be such that their defense
is made easier."
"The former German Baltic provinces
shall be incorporated, thenceforth fur-
nishing new cereal fields for German
peasant emigrants, thus protecting the
empire against the dangers of famine."
"Courland, Lithuania, Livonia and
Estonia are to be colonized."
"One million eight hundred thousand
tons of Roumanian petrol will be at the
disposition of Germany."
"Those nations who attacked peaceful
Germany must pay all war charges in
raw material, ships, ready money and
territorial concessions, leaving Germany
with only \$5,000,000,000 national debt."

**CAMPAIGN FOR
EDUCATION ON
LOBSTER BEGINS**

Dr. A. P. Knight Speaks of
Waste in Conducting
Hatcheries

**SIMPLY TOO MANY
LOBSTERS CAUGHT**

Experts to Urge Increased
Egg Production and Pro-
tection of Females—U. S.
Method Not an Economical
One.

That in the lobster hatchery in Char-
lottetown (P. E. I.), during one season
only 100,000 fry were produced and
reached the sea out of 90,000,000 eggs,
was the startling statement made to The
Telegraph yesterday by Professor A. P.
Knight, professor of animal husbandry at
Queens University, Kingston (Ont.), and
a member of the board of biological re-
search of the commission of conservation,
Ottawa. Dr. Knight reached the city
yesterday and explained that he came
to New Brunswick to do some mis-
sionary work in the interests of the
lobster industry.

The best authority on this continent
estimates that one fry out of from 5,000
to 15,000, placed in the water, out of
lobster hatcheries, reaches its maturity.
Taking this ratio as a guide, Dr. Knight
stated that every lobster egg developed
to fry in the hatcheries and reaching its
maturity in the sea cost the government
of Canada \$2.50. This figure was ar-
rived at without taking into considera-
tion all the capital invested in the
hatcheries and was simply figured on
the operating expenses of each hatchery
each season.

Catch Decreasing.

Since 1897 the lobster catch has been
steadily falling off. Statistics show that
since that year the lobster catch has
fallen in this province from two million
to one and one-half million pounds of
the canned variety and that the live
branch of the industry has slumped
85 per cent.

"This falling off is due entirely to
over-fishing," said Dr. Knight. "We
are catching today far more lobsters than
the race of lobsters can possibly produce
each season. In 1897 the catch was
2,000,000 lbs. and in 1909-10 it was 1,000,000
lbs. and the lobster industry about
half that amount."

Since 1897 the number of traps set
in this province has increased from 100,000
to 300,000. Dr. Knight said that the
traps were set in the province and in
periods of five years had been closed
because of their failure to secure packs.
In the Dominion and I have found by
investigation that at least two thirds of
the eggs hatched out into fry. In investi-
gations he said Dr. Knight, "and only
one third of those hatched out into fry
ever reach the sea." In investigations
he had made he found in the eggs in the
early stages of development eight per
cent. dead and at a later date he found
about thirty per cent. dead. A careful
examination showed that before the fry
were actually hatched out that eighty
per cent. of the eggs were dead. In one
instance two years ago, out of 1,000,000
eggs in a certain Canadian hatchery only
150,000 were returned to the sea alive.

U. S. Method Wasteful.

Discussing the method adopted by the
United States government he stated that
in the pond at Pemaquid (Me.), that
one-third of the seed lobsters were lost
during the winter that were kept in the
compound there. The results of the work
in the United States have not been
checked as they have been in Canada
and it was therefore difficult to give any
figure in regard to the actual
success of the scheme.

One Open Season.

"There are ten districts in Canada
with ten different open seasons," said
Dr. Knight. "I would urge one closed
season for all districts and one open
season common to them all. June,
July, August and September is the
breeding season of the lobster and he
was of the opinion that these months
should be made closed season for the
fishing of lobsters. He would also urge
that the fishermen be allowed to take
from the water no lobster under eight
inches and no lobster over twelve inches
in length. He explained that the lobster
under eight inches had not reached ma-
turity and the lobster over twelve inches
was a breeder and should be left in the
sea.

"The lobster, of course, will never be
exterminated as we have exterminated
the buffalo and wild pigeon in Canada,
but they will be caught in such large
numbers that finally it will become un-
profitable to fish lobsters in this country.
"Increased egg production is what I
am going to urge upon the fishermen,"
he said. He explained that in experi-
ments, carried out at Long Beach Point,
Digby County (N. S.), that in a com-
pound in which he placed forty-seven
females and seventeen males, on dipping
the lobsters up three months later he
found that sixty-four per cent. carried
eggs while in St. Mary's Bay, near by,
under ordinary conditions only four fe-
males in 100 carried eggs. He therefore
urges upon the fishermen the necessity
of constructing floating pens or en-
closures in which may be placed lobsters
both male and female and that these be
allowed to remain there during breeding
time. In this way he believes that the
lobster industry will finally be brought
up to the position it held some years ago.
While here, Dr. Knight will visit all
the important centers and place these
facts and figures before the owners. In
order to reach the fishermen seven
gentlemen have been selected for dif-
ferent districts as follows: Professor
Vachon of Laval university for the east-
ern part of New Brunswick; Professor
Hebert of U. N. B. for Cape Breton
Island; Andrew Hallett of the fisheries
service of Ottawa for the north shore of
Nova Scotia and Rex Dr. MacGillivray,
an authority on this sub-
ject will take the western shore of Nova
Scotia. In this way it is hoped that the
gospel of conserving the lobster will be
brought to and accepted by the people.

dent—Business of Company
Buoyant and Increasing—
Financial Statement.

Fredericton, May 16—The annual
meeting of the New Brunswick Tele-
phone Company was held here this after-
noon beginning at 4 o'clock and follow-
ing a meeting of the general board of
directors. Officers were elected as fol-
lows: President, S. H. White; 1st vice
president, Hon. F. P. Thompson; 2nd
vice-president, Lieutenant-Colonel F. B.
Black; additional directors are W. B.
Snowball, R. O'Leary, F. W. Sumner, A.
W. Bennett, J. M. Robinson, Lieutenant-
Colonel J. L. McAvity, R. B. Emerson,
H. P. Robinson, Hon. I. L. Todd, A. B.
Slipp, Hon. F. B. Carvell, L. B. McFar-
lane.

The business of the company was re-
ported to be buoyant and increasing but
unfortunately not in proportion to the
cost of labor and material. This feature
of the operations of the company was
discussed in full, together with its prob-
able effect upon the earnings of the
company.

The matter of improved telephone ser-
vice at Miramichi was discussed and the
matter will be looked into. It is hoped
that a proposition can be made to the
people of that place which will result in
a marked improvement in telephone fa-
cilities.

DIVISION ON C. N. R. BILL

Ottawa, May 16—The bill to em-
power the government to meet C. N. R. matu-
ring securities, amounting to approxi-
mately \$87,000,000, was reported in the
house tonight. It now stands for third
reading. Decision was reached after con-
siderable discussion in committee—a dis-
cussion which was continued from Wed-
nesday.

Hon. Charles Murphy had moved an
amendment, the effect of which would be
to make the bill apply solely to matu-
ring securities between now and March
31, 1919, the close of the fiscal year. The
amendment provided also that a sched-
ule, giving the maturing securities, should
be attached to the bill.

The amendment was rejected by 75
to 47, and the bill was reported. Op-
position members objected, however, to
its being read a third time. Third read-
ing will, therefore, come up later.

Ottawa, May 16—The Yukon election
case goes back to the committee on pri-
vileges and elections. Following a discus-
sion which lasted for a large part of the
day, and following two divisions of the
house, a motion of non-concurrence was
adopted, and the report of the committee
went back for further consideration.
