LARGEST CASTING EVER MADE IN PROVINCES

Due Weighing Thirty-five Tons Run in Amherst—Visit of Rev. P. J. Stackhouse to St. John

Amherst, April 29—Your correspondent in afternoon had the pleasure of witnessing the making of the largest casting ever run in the maritime provinces, and one of the largest made in Canada. It is part of the bed for one of three rolling mills, being made by the Robt Engineering Company for the Dominion Iron Steel Co. at Sydney.

The casting is about forty feet long, seven feet wide, and will weigh thirty-five tons. There were fourteen tons of iron used and 2,000 feet of lumber required for the pattern.

The contract for the three engines was awarded in Campbellton with German and American making bids. It will take three to four weeks for this casting to be completed and removed from the mould.

Miss Hussey, of Pugwash, has sold his mill and will leave in June for the Columbia to reside. He is a valued member of the municipal council and his removal from Cumberland county is greatly regretted.

It is bound to have a detrimental effect on the stock market, but that is more serious than it is likely to have a depressing effect on business and check the revival that is gradually coming in. The political situation now holds the front of the stage, and it is certainly most mixed. We also think the drop situation from now on will have to be watched carefully as it is liable to play an important part. This will be true largely owing to the fact that the stock market has been a perpendicular rise of ten to fifteen points, and it looked upon the political situation as practically settled. It will undoubtedly take several days for the market in Pennsylvania to be felt.

We look for sagging of prices and while the bulls will undoubtedly try to rally the market, they will meet stock on the advance and it will be a two-sided market.
