I've asked five people and they all said they thought this as the best thing to do.

So Molly, the little stenographer lady, told me the other day. We were talking over a decision she had to make. The course which her five friends had advised her to follow was the course which I happen to know, in her inmost heart she really wants to follow.

Do you know I think the psychology of advice is a most interesting subject. Did you ever think about it?

Nine people out of ten—casual people, I mean; not your real close friends who have your welfare enough at heart to really put some thought in the matter—if you ask their advice will advise you to do the thing they think you want to do.

Sometimes they do this consciously and intentionally. I know a girl who frankly says: "If anyone asks my advice I always feel anxious to find what they want me to say and then say it. It's a tip top way to make people like you and think your judgment is good."

(Incidentally, she was one of the five people Molly had been consulting.)

But often times your counselors are quite unconscious that they are doing this. It is simply that your unintentionally hypnotize them into your way of thinking.

The desire may be to get your own way. You may not even think you know what you want to do. And the influence you exercise may not be recognized by them, but that is what happens just the same, and one should take it into account in reckoning the value of advice.

This giving advice is a queer business anyway. People go about it with extraordinary responsibility.

You know the old riddle: "What is it that everybody likes to give and nobody cares to take?" and its answer "Advice."

Isn't strange that we can feel that way about it?

Suppose you give a piece of advice about a comparatively small matter—whether your friend shall go to this place or that for his summer vacation, for instance.

In the meantime, the girl has eloped and with the two calamities the mother's heart is quite broken. Now at Hotel M she might have met just the right man; you know what you want to do. And the influence you exercise may not be recognized by them, but that is what happens just the same, and one should take it into account in reckoning the value of advice.

Think how your advice changed the current not only of her life, but of other lives and how it will change the current of lives to be the third and fourth generation—may to the very end of the world.

Truly, I wonder how, instead of being a gift with one's pebbles of advice, we dare throw the very tiniest one into the pool of one's friend's life.

The Prussian Order of Merit—Sir Francis Bacon and The Preservation of Meats—Protecting Memory of Royal Dead

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which he so much affected, as "Pour le Merite." But he restricted it to military men, thirty in number.

Frederick William IV., acting under the advice of Alexander von Humboldt, added the civil division, the statute of which differed from those of the military members; for the military order is solely and entirely in the gift of the King of Prussia; whereas in the case of the civil division, the monarch merely ratifies the choice of the chapter, in which his military knights have no voice.

Alexander von Humboldt's idea in suggesting the addition to the order did not meet with the approval of the famous German poet, Ludwig Uhland, who, taking the ground that there should be no question of hierarchy in the world of letters, was the first to decline the honor. His example was followed by several others, the most notable instances being Herbar and the late Herbert Spencer.

Two Divisions, One Class

There are, therefore, two divisions in the Prussian order, there is but one class. The membership of the order carries with it no title of nobility rank. In fact, the majority of the ablest, noblest members of the civil division belong to the bourgeoisie. But they constitute the very cream of the science, art, and literature of Germany. The foreign knights are restricted to the number of twenty-five, and are elected by the civil German knights.

The insignia consists of an eight-pointed, blue enamel cross, mounted in gold, bearing the Prussian eagle, surmounted by a crown. This is surmounted by an "E" and a crown. This is the most noble insignia.

That of the civil division is slightly different, the cross being enfolded with a ribbon of gold bordered blue, and has the effect of framing the badge into a sort of installation. In both instances, the insignia is worn suspended from the neck by a ribbon of black moire, with a narrow border of silver.

Royal Academy Feiture

Sir Francis Bacon's fine statue, by F. W. Pomeroy, of the Royal Academy, is the feature of the Royal Academy exhibition this year in London; and in view of the fact that Sir Francis is the inventor of that method of preserving meat, by the frozen process, to which the Argentine Republic owes so much of its prosperity, it should have found a purchaser in one of the English stock yard barons of Argentina, and that its future home will be in his house, or rather palace in Buenos Ayres.

In this connection it is well to recall that New Zealand has already erected a monument to Sir Francis Bacon, popularly known as the "great Lord Bacon," in recognition of his services, not in writing the works of Shakespeare, but in actually bringing about his death by his enthusiasm in experimenting with the notion. Driving in Highbury one day, he left his carriage to collect some snow with which to stuff a fowl, by way of noting the effect of cold on the preservation of its flesh. In doing this he brought on an attack of bronchitis, to which he succumbed in a few days.

It has taken nearly three centuries for the idea to work out to the practical benefit of the United States, Argentina and Australia. But, late as it is, the leaders of the great frozen meat industry of the United States might do worse than follow the example of New Zealand, and erect, preferably in Chicago, a statue to the man who, while he may not have written Shakespeare's works, certainly did invent the method of preserving meat by means of cold.

Incidentally, it should be stated that it is incorrect to speak of this philosopher, lawyer, statesman, and inventor, as "Lord Bacon"; many of his English biographers, even being guilty of this mistake. His correct designation was "Sir Francis Bacon," after which he became Lord Verulam, and he died as Viscount St. Albans. But he was never "Lord Bacon."

How he came to be styled thus, was as follows: While still a mere knight, he was appointed to the dignity of lord keeper of the great seal, which caused him to be addressed, in those days as "Lord Keeper Bacon." At that epoch, the office of the keeper of the great seal, and of the lord high chancellor, were separate. Twelve months after being appointed lord keeper of the great seal, he was elevated to the woodcock as lord high chancellor, and at the same time was created
