Outburst of Disapproval.

Boxing in this State is a flourishing condition at this time, but it is not without its enemies and it behooves those who have the sport in their charge to make sure that nothing transpires which can reflect in any way upon the sport. If the officials were wrong it will be contended they were honest mistakes. Of that there can be no doubt, but it is strictly up to the commission to see that mistakes are not made.

There are certain well defined rules to guide officials in reaching their decisions in boxing bouts. Clean hitting and foot work are other items that must be weighed in the balance. Damage done and the condition of the men at the expiration of the last round are things that must be given consideration. If these major matters are given the proper consideration officials will not make mistakes in judgment. It is understood that Chairman Muldoon is determined to see that the men and referees who are prone to make mistakes. He should not delay in so doing. This is a situation that calls for prompt and aggressive action.

SCHAEFER BALKS AND MATCH MAY BE CANCELLED

Challenger Says if Levis is Named He Will Not Play—Another Meeting.

New York, March 10.—“If Levis is selected as referee there will be no match.” Thus did Young Jake Schaefer bring to an end a three-hour discussion, the purpose of which was to name a referee for the Hoppe-Schaefer match for the world's 18.2 ballline billiard championship which will be played at the Hotel Pennsylvania on March 12, 13 and 14.

A long list of professional and amateur billiardists was submitted, but only a few met with approval. Wire Office to Morningstar.

Hoppe and Schaefer both agreed to Morningstar. Mr. Miller immediately sent a message to Morningstar, but the latter's acceptance is considered doubtful, due to the distance he must travel and the lateness of the offer. The next choice seemed to be Harry Cline. Hoppe expressed no opposition, while Schaefer appeared willing to agree.

Peterson and Cutler have refereed many big matches and both have proved that they are capable and competent officials. They are eliminated for the present, however, for Cutler is working with Schaefer and Peterson is helping to get Hoppe in shape for the championship match.

Schaefer made it known at one time during the afternoon that he would have no objection to Peterson, but when Hoppe stated he would not care to have Cutler officiate Peterson's name was temporarily stricken from the list.

Aside from the fact that Schaefer objects to Levis for personal reasons, he also has been credited with saying that Levis, who is an amateur, is not the man to referee such an important match. He said he never agreed to the Levis selection and that when Levis was appointed he never was notified. Hoppe was very disappointed when he learned last Friday that Schaefer intended to protest Levis. The champion refused to make any comment at the time and even recently he said he had no objections to Levis and would like to see him referee.

Question Must Be Settled Soon. “Schaefer has personal grievances among his reasons for making the protest,” said Peterson last night. “If the club is certain that there will be no match if the promoters insist on Levis, Schaefer is determined to have someone to say about the selection of the referee. He is equally determined that Levis shall not be the man. However, the question must be settled soon.”

“As far as the referee goes, we all like to see a capable man in there,” said Hoppe. “But I think that the Schaefer protest came just a little too late. He had at least three weeks to declare himself, but instead he waited until almost the last minute. I don't know the purpose of the delay, but I refuse to let it interfere with my play for after all it will be the one who makes 1,500 points first that wins, and the referee will not have a cue in hand.”

According to the rules governing the match, the Brunswick-Balke-Clendenen Company is entitled to the final say in the selection of the referee. But thus far the officials of the company hope to have the players come to some agreement before they take any definite stand.

HOPE MAKES GRAND AVERAGE OF 108 FOR 2,600 POINTS

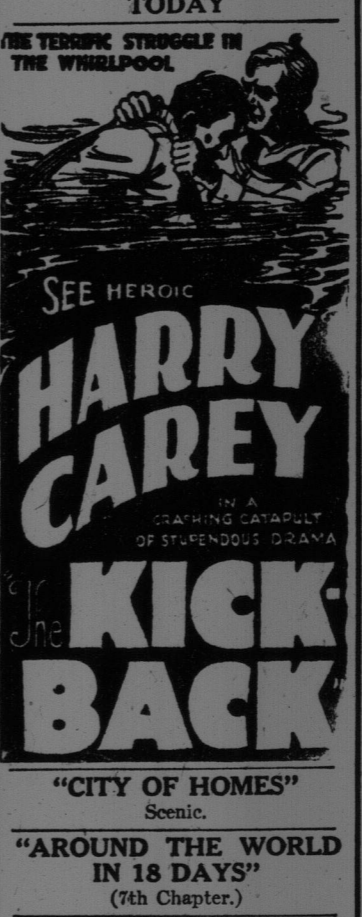
EARL SMITH SIGNS.
