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PELEPSCOT CO. HAS BUSY SEASON

The Pelepscot Paper Company, with over 20,000 cords of pulpwood to ship, about three million of logs to manufacture and ship, is going to have a very busy season. The shipping season opened last week with Barges No. 2 and 3 docked at Salmon River, No. 2 loading long lumber for Eastern Manufacturing Co., Bangor, Maine, and Barge No. 3 loading pulpwood for Bath, Maine. Also Barge No. 1 at Tynemouth Creek loading pulpwood for Bath, The Pelepscot Co. has a fleet of portable mills, have just completed a cut of over two million feet of stock for the Salmon River, a dispatch and haul to Salmon River, a dispatch and haul to Salmon River, where it will be shipped from this port. The drive of the main Salmon River and branches amounts to approximately 6,000 cords of pulpwood and 100,000 cords of long logs. The drive is under charge of Thomas Alexander and over 10,000 cords of wood will be driven there. Many improvements are being made at the mill, Salmon River. A new dam is being built which will run direct from the mill to the mill, thus eliminating the old system of car and horse power. Concrete foundations has been placed under the engine forming the auxiliary power plant which was installed last year for loading purposes.

CATTLE PRICES IN ARGENTINA LOWEST IN FIFTEEN YEARS

Extreme Depression in Market for Beef Continued Through 1923.

The extreme depression in the market for beef in Argentina which began in 1921, due to over-expansion in production, continued through 1923. The average price of chilled best steers in Buenos Aires for 1923, calculated on the basis of live weight in United States currency, was \$2.94, compared with \$3.94 in 1922. The average price for the best grade of beef steers in the five-year 1919-1923 period of low land values and generally low production cost was \$3.94. The average in the seven years 1914-1920 was \$3.75, with a maximum of \$4.50 in 1919, and a minimum of \$2.50 in 1920.

C. P. R. OFFERS 12 MILLION BONDS

Montreal, April 14.—The flotation of a \$12,000,000 Canadian Pacific five per cent. bond issue and the confining of its distribution to Canada, is an event of importance in the current financial history of this country. It is another indication of Canada's "coming of age" in financial matters. Forty years or so ago, when the men who built the C. P. R. had thrown all their fortunes and those of their friends into the venture, and were seeking in Europe and the U. S. the means of completing their task, the success of \$12,000,000 loan for public subscription in Canada alone would have been extremely hazardous. The bond issue is of note mostly because of its being offered only to Canadians and because it is the first Canadian Pacific loan put out in Canada.

In 1907, the total issue of the company's common stock, 475 per cent. was held in this country, and the rate of interest has been more marked in recent years, despite the fact that the same interest has been an increase in Great Britain's holdings of the stock, which have advanced to 40 per cent. of the total issue, and which together with the British Empire total approximately 70 per cent. of the company's active securities.
