

# TELEGRAPH NEWS.

LONDON, May 8th.  
Steamer East Eign was sunk yesterday off Stairs, having collided with an unknown vessel.

The captain and mate and their families were lost, only seven on board escaped death.

The Observer writes the names of the survivors of the shipwreck.

OTTAWA, May 8.  
The Governor General has commended the House of Commons the following despatch from London.

Downing Street, 19th April, 1870.  
"Sir.—With reference to previous correspondence with respect to the protection of Canadian fisheries I have the honor to inform you that the Board of Admiralty have been requested to send to Canadian waters a force sufficient to protect Canadian fishermen and maintain order."

At the opening of the House to-day Dr. Brown, M. P., one of the medical men attending the Premier, said Sir John was suffering from a severe attack of bilious calculus or gall stone. He cannot appear again in the House this session. He is still unfit to be removed to his home from his office, and will be unable to attend to public business for some weeks.

Sir George E. Cartier announced that correspondence with the British Government on the Fishery question was completed, and would be brought down on Monday.

The debate on the second reading of the Red River Bill was resumed.

McKenzie spoke for over an hour, making a strong attack on Howe for his conduct at Red River, and for employing Wheeler, of the St. Paul Free Press, as a negotiator, to be the medium of communication between the Government and the authorities at Red River. He said Howe was a traitor, living at the public expense as a member of the Government, while plotting treason against the public interests.

He was followed by Harrison, who blamed McKenzie's blunders for much of the difficulty. He said this was not a question of party but a question of country. The Government should allow the House to take charge of the measure, and he hoped amendments would be made.

The debate will be continued to-night.

The Government to-day approved of all contracts for Rolling Stock for the Intercolonial Railway recommended by the Railway Commissioners.

London, May 7.  
In the House of Commons to-night, Mr. Mowat, Under Colonial Secretary, explained that a compromise on the Red River difficulty had been effected by the introduction into the Dominion Parliament of a bill creating the Province of Manitoba. He stated Canada would retain all the public lands of the New Province with the exception of 12,000 acres to secure its debt.

New York, May 7.  
A fire in Quincy, Ill., yesterday destroyed \$300,000 worth of property.

The Beaver Mill, in North Adams, Mass., was also burned, and other fires swept the total of losses to over \$500,000.

The great religious court of the year, as the meeting of the Evangelical Alliance in New York. The list of those from abroad who are expected to take part in it embraces representatives of the universities of Berlin, of Geneva, of Florence, of Göttingen, and of Halle, Rev. It is said the land is in a fair way to be built without Congressional aid, and the railroad is only to increase the fortunes of the stockholders of the Central Pacific Railroad.

Recent advices from Ireland describe that country to be in a fearful state. In some places the landlords never trust themselves outside their doors without weapons in their hands. The wealthiest of them have corps of soldiers billeted on their estates, and when they wish to go any distance a guard always goes with them. Even the soldiers are afraid of their lives, and many of them, when they can, refuse to serve in such a business. The very significant warning given to the landlords, now, that of digging graves in front of their doors, shows plainly what is intended for them if they do not coincide with the wishes of the disaffected.

THE INDIANS.—It is thought now there is no preventive to the Indian war, and that it will commence soon as grass is anywhere high on the prairies for the feed of the Indians' horses is also pretty certain. A few days ago some three hundred warriors drove off a large drove of cattle from near Clayville, but a detachment of cavalry subsequently recovered them. Gen. Sheridan is out West at present, and he intends to make a survey of the whole situation before returning to the East. Gen. Sherman says that if it is left to Sheridan everything will be well. There are but 4,000 troops on the Western frontier, and it is thought that there will be 10,000 Sioux at least in the near path.

THE BRANCH of the Bank of British North America, at St. Stephen, has commenced business; the demands of the mercantile interests of the County requiring more facilities than could be afforded by the St. Stephen Bank, hence the necessity for the Branch recently established in that locality. The first business transacted over its counters, we learn, was by a St. Andrew's man, and we trust that it was the beginning of prosperous transactions for the Bank; in saying this, we express the wishes of our townsmen.

THE NEW Dominion ship plasters recently issued are already being counterfeited; this may be expected, as the counterfeiters of the United States, have begun at work with considerable success on their own National currency.

A majority of the Congregation of Trinity Church, St. John, are opposed to the Church Synod of this Province, as at present constituted. At a small meeting lay delegates were elected; the opponents having discovered this, called another meeting which was largely attended and a resolution was passed rescinding and annulling the appointment of the lay delegates, and that copies of the resolution be sent to the Bishop and to the delegates. The meeting is reported to have been a stormy one.

Incendiarism is making itself apparent in Woodstock. Some weeks ago a fire was found in the rear of Mr. Wm. O'Donnell's building, just in time to prevent its becoming destructive. On Wednesday morning last some time after midnight, a fire was discovered in the cellar and one of the shops on the ground floor of the same building, and extinguished in time to save it from complete destruction.

An attempt was made Tuesday evening, and repeated on Wednesday, to throw trains from the track of the Boston, Hartford & Erie road, in the vicinity of Franklin, Mass., by placing sleepers on the track. The attempt in the morning nearly succeeded with the Norfolk steamboat train, which was checked a few feet from the obstructions, through the exertions of Wm. M. Conery.

The Supreme Court of the United States has refused the petition of the Kansas Pacific Railway for an injunction restraining the collection of the State taxes on its road and property.

The region of country drained by the Colorado river is said to equal in extent the States of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa and Missouri.
