

The father was proud of the daughter's skill as a cook; the mother, who had grown careless and shiftless and indifferent, was shamed by it. The cousequence was better provision on the part of one or more care in preparation on the part of the other.

The mother was by no means above turning to account some of the practical knowledge the daughter had acquired under such competent training, and she began also to brush up her own knowledge that she had carelessly allowed to fall into disuse. The result is a happy home, a united family, a cheerful, contented, busy wife, and a man who puts into the family, larder what formerly went to the saloon .-Baltimore News.

Broaden it by Letting him Look Into Every Phrase of Life

Development in this Line will Prove in valuable to a Successful Career.

Expand the child's mind by showing him from time to time scenes from all sides of life. Take him today to studios and let him see how pictures are made; next week to silk factories, to learn the poetry of labor, and afterward to a brick-yard and an iron-foundry, not forgetting the claims of great churches and monuments upon an elevating education. The alternation of city and courty is a delightful stimulant. When travel is possible we should give the child glimpses of mountains and sights of the sea, and let him become acquainted with mountaineers and fishermen, even as he ought in town to know something of the ways and thoughts of the workmen, so that he may come to feel sy thy with all sorts of people and un-derstand the merit of labor. Actual experience of this kind is worth infinitely more than the theorizing in school-books. It is not particularly interesting to a child to read that he should be garteful to all the people who supply him with his daily comforts; to the farmer, the baker, the manufacturer, the builder. For Defending his Master Against French Detectives

Who were in a Gamblers Employ -- International Complications May Kesult.

Paris, Oct. 17.—A great sensation has been caused here by the murder of an Englishman named Derrick, by French detectives at Dieppe. Derrick was so shockingly injured that an unusual surgical operation had to be performed upon him, with the result that gangrene intervened and he died. Derrick was set upon at the same Derrick was set upon at the same time as his master, a wealthy Englishman named Capt. O'Neill Murphy, lishman named Capt. O'Neill Murphy, who is a hypother-in-law of Sir Charles Wolseley, and a cogsin by marriage of Lord Wolseley, the British commander-in-chief. Capt. Murphy had incurred the wrath of the Dieppe casino officials because he had caused a director of the Petits Chevaux at [alais to be condemned for swindless.] a director of the Petits Chevaux at Caiais to be condemned for swindling. The Calais and Dieppe casinos are under the management of the same man, an adventurer and exgaol bird, named Bloch.

Bloch, with the assistance of the local procureur of the republic, otherwise the public prosecutor, an official

local procureur of the republic, otherwise the public prosecutor, an official whom he had under his protection, caused Capt. Murphy's feotsteps to be dogged, and finally a night assault to be made upon him, as a result of which Derrick lost his life.

Capt. Murphy is one of the most respected English residents of Paris; he is a brother of D, F. Murphy, of San Francisco. In spite of his passport

Francisco. In spite of his passport and credentials he was hauled off to jail, stripped and measured, and finally sentenced to eight days' imprison' ment for protecting his own house against armed thieves who had attacked it in the name of the law.

Those farmers who stopped milking and turned in the calves will then see the mistake they made. They will find that their cows are not nearly as good milkers as they were before, and it wifl take them several years to build

up an efficient dairy herd again. If there is any one thing about dairying that has been thoroughly and completely demonstrated, it is that milking makes milkers. The best cow in the world can be ruined as a milker in a comparatively short time by simply letting the calf suck her or by carelessness in milking. The poorest cow can be improved by continued and persistent milking. The man who has 10 or 12 or more cows and milks them year in and year out, keeps right at it and practices improved methods of feeding will get ahead right along. It don't pay to milk the cows one year and let the calves suck the next .-Creamery Gazette.


