Almost Entire Army Ready For Service - 2,000 Troops Moved Towards Swedish Boundary.

Stockholm, Sweden, June 30 .- A tele gram from Tronhjen to the Jamtlands Posten, announces that almost the entire Norwegian army has been mobilized, and that three classes of conscription are armed and in training. On Tuesday, it is added. 2,000 infantry

were moved toward the Swedish bound-ary. Sixty-five cars and two engines were sent south from Tronhjen to assist in the movement of troops.






