

A VISIT TO THE SALMON TRAPS

An Industry of Great Promise Springing Up Along Southern Shore of Vancouver Island

The first lift of salmon by the Capital City Canning & Packing Company of Victoria was witnessed on Friday last by a small party composed of officers of the company and a few guests who were honored with an invitation to be present on the occasion.

For the sake of these and of all who have not been able to witness what has taken place, but an hour's sail from their own city, it may be wise to set down categorically what has been done, and to state that last year only two traps could be installed before fishing commenced, and these were to some extent at least tentative and experimental in character.

That was about a year ago before the fact had been proven that salmon could be taken in paying quantities on the Vancouver Island coast.

The base for this little fleet is the scene of considerable industrial development, but of late years almost abandoned by vessels in the regular pursuit of trade.

Even this is not all, as the party steamed in to Esquimalt harbor in the evening they could see near the upper end of the bay the roofs of the large cannery, which has already been erected to cure the salmon and prepare it for market.

If all this expansion has taken place in twelve months it does not require a very vivid imagination to paint what the next five years will do in developing this new industry tributary to Victoria.

Even this, important though it is, is but an index of other trade activities, which are bound to follow. On Friday the Capital City Canning & Packing Company's guests assisted in planting in the waters of Sooke harbor two bar-traps of the latest type.

good ship Maude, the old packet which has in days past served almost successive generations as a carrier out of this port. In the old days when she sailed down past Otter Point, Sooke and Alberni, she was a side wheeler with a penchant for a kind of "rolling" against which no police regulations were leveled.

In order to be at the traps before seven the Maude sailed at the glory hour of 9 in the morning, and reached Otter Point by 6.30. Here the tug Butte awaited them, and to her they were transferred in one of the fine dorys built for the company by W. Turpel, and which takes no account of chopping seas.

These traps have now been explained by letter press and half tone in the Times on a number of occasions, thus rendering almost unnecessary any description of them. Briefly, they are the simple adaptation of the gentleman's corral. They consist of piles on which nets are hung, the whole system being in the form of the letter L reversed.

To see several hundred of these beautiful game fish lifted at one operation is a sight full of interest. The net having barely commenced there were not more than six hundred in the Otter Point trap, although the Sherringham Point trap, which was afterwards visited but not lifted seemed to contain double that number.

Throughout the trip the officers of the company spared no pains in attending to the comforts, material and otherwise, of their guests. If through a combination of weak stomachs and head seas some of said guests were not able to properly appreciate their attention, the fault does not lie at their door.
