Assuredly, very limited is the number of persons who do not have in their possession some ancient medals, some foreign coins or postage stamps, some curious works of art, etc., etc., etc.; and what better use can the possessors of such objects make than in presenting them to a museum, where these curiosities will be carefully preserved and permanently exhibited in the interests of general information, or science? The owners will not, indeed, miss them greatly; whilst the Institution shall be made the richer by them. On his part, the Rev. Curator of the Museum will be but too happy and careful to record in a register kept for that purpose and, also, in the annual Catalogues of the Students, the nature of all donations, with the names of the kind donors.
