Then they applied to Mesars. Yarrow & Co., who considered that the thing could be done in a month. They booked the order, commenced the work on April 28, and in twenty-three working days, or by May 23, the boat had made her trial. This vessel was 100 feet long by 18 wide, and, like the two built for England, was made in portable sections, which could be exerted on a steamer and put together affoat. She steamed ten miles an hour and carried 100 troope. -[Cassiers Magazine.]
