RIVER COMMISSION TAKING EVIDENCE AT FREDERICTON

Acts Relating to Driving Companies Submitted—Lewis H. Bliss Tells of Difficulties of Low Water-Driving.

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 29.—The St. John River Commission met at ten thirty this morning in the Supreme Court chambers with all the members present.

Mr. Gregory, counsel for the Canadian commissioners, also submitted a number of acts of legislation relating to the St. John River Log Driving Company.

Mr. Gregory explained that all operations on the river could become members of the company by filing a statement before the annual meeting of the quantity of lumber they expected to drive during the year.

Mr. Bliss, in reply to Mr. Fellows, that the company had the exclusive rights to drive all the logs between Grand Falls and the boom limits, and also on the Aroostook River from a boundary line.

Mr. Bliss was examined by Mr. Gregory in regard to the company's operations and the condition of the river between Grand Falls and Fredericton.

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
