

NEWS SUMMARY.

Domination. Thursday, November 23rd, has been appointed general Thanksgiving day for the Dominion. Arrangements have been completed for the reception of the Governor General in Montreal on next Wednesday. The Montreal city assessors have made an increase this year in the value of real estate of thirty-seven million dollars. In the live stock department of the World's Fair, Canadian breeders have 494 entries of sheep and 86 of swine. The show will open next Monday. It is not thought improbable in some Ottawa circles that Sir John Thompson will be shortly called to the Judicial Committee of the Imperial Privy Council. There is a serious outbreak of typhoid fever at Carleton Place, which the Ontario Government's health officer believes to have been caused by impure drinking water. The Dominion Ministers have been invited to attend a meeting of the Montreal Board of Trade on Thursday, the 29th inst., at which Lord Aberdeen will be present. Cornwall, Ont., has won a curfew bell, which is rung every night at nine o'clock, after which all children under fourteen years of age can be arrested if found in the streets. Messrs. Coates, Bon & Co., of London, have issued one hundred and fifty thousand pounds worth of three per cent. forty year bonds for the city of Montreal at ninety. A special dispatch from Brisbane, N. S. W., states that the prime minister recommends that a twenty-five thousand dollar annual subsidy be granted to the Victoria, B. C. mail service. Sir Oliver Mowat has accepted the invitation of the Canadian Club to deliver a short address on the occasion of the celebration of the battle of Queenston Heights, to be held in Hamilton next month. Lord Aberdeen has consented to open the Canada Central Fair in Ottawa on Tuesday next, and on the same day he will receive an address of welcome from the mayor and corporation of the city. What is thought to be a valuable deposit of iron ore has been discovered near Chipman, Q. C. The specimens are now being tested, and if they prove valuable a new industry will be opened up in that locality. In the House of Commons Thursday, referring to the foreign policy of the Government, Sir Richard Temple said that he believed the people of Newfoundland had cause for grave dissatisfaction with the modus vivandi. The inquest touching the death of Angus McLeod, who was shot dead at Nanapan by a burglar, was returned on Monday night, and Frederick Somerville, who was arrested on suspicion, proved an undoubted alibi, and was acquitted. Owen E. Murphy, one of the most important witnesses in the case of the Queen against Connolly, appeared a few days ago before a commission sent to New York, and positively refused to give any evidence whatever. The Montreal Star suggests that the city of Montreal should purchase the fine residence of Mr. Duncan McIntyre, which is offered for three hundred thousand dollars, as a viceregal residence for the Governor-General. Mr. Fred Campbell, junior member of the well-known Montreal paper firm of Boyd, Byrie & Campbell, against which the Customs Department brings some serious charges, committed suicide on Thursday evening by shooting himself in the heart with a revolver. At the provincial examination for teacher's licenses at Halifax, in July last, two colored ladies, daughters of Robert Williams, of Fall River, Halifax county, obtained C and D certificates. One of these young ladies has been engaged in teaching for five years. George W. Oulton, of Moncton, who made two attempts at suicide at Boston on September 1, tried again on Wednesday by throwing himself into the Charles River. He fought desperately with two rescuers and tried hard to get out of the water. In his last words he said: "Out of work, out of money, out of friends and out of sympathy with the world." Oulton has been drinking heavily and it is believed to have affected his mind. The first general synod of the Church of England in Canada was progressed on Wednesday evening, after a session lasting seven working days. The next meeting will be held in Winnipeg, commencing on the second Wednesday in September, 1896. Amongst other important closing business transacted by the general synod was the unanimous adoption by both houses of an emphatic declaration of the absolute necessity of the religious teaching in the public schools. British and Foreign. Cholera in Buda Pesth is spreading among the wealthier classes, which causes considerable uneasiness. The miners' strike in the Department of Pas de Calais has already begun to spread to other districts of France. The police have intimidated to all the London banks that a gang of expert American forgers are now on their way to London. There is again trouble between the Vatican and the Quirinal, and the rumor of the removal of the Pope to Spain once more revived. The marriage of Miss Flora Davis to Lord Terence Blackwood, youngest son of the Marquis of Dufferin, is fixed to take place in Paris, on October 19. The London section of the National Liberal Federation, at a meeting held last week, unanimously adopted a resolution declaring in favor of the abolition of hereditary legislation. The Pope has sent a letter to Mgr. Satali, the Papal legate to the United States, giving expression to the satisfaction which he feels at the union of a circle of friends in the loss of a worthy American clergy, who has been com-

Highest of all in Leavening Power.—Latest U. S. Gov't Report.



The Brazilian revolutionists are rapidly gaining an upper hand, and it is expected that President Peixoto's days of power are numbered. Admiral Melo has demanded the surrender of Rio Janeiro under threat of a renewed and vigorous bombardment. Three new cases of small pox were reported on Thursday morning in New York. President Cleveland has nominated Mr. James J. Van Alen, of Rhode Island, as United States Ambassador to Italy. John G. Drew, lately associate editor of the Irish World, died on Monday, at Elizabeth, N. J. He was 72 years of age. The directors of the World's Fair have definitely decided that the Exhibition must be closed on November 31, as originally intended. The Committee on Territories of the United States House of Representatives has decided to report a bill for the admission of Utah as a State. The New Opera house at Canton, Ill., was destroyed by fire on Tuesday night, and several persons in the audience were fatally injured. Ravages of cholera in St. Petersburg are rapidly increasing. New cases reported reach an average of fifty a day, while the deaths from the disease reach almost the same number. By an explosion of gas in Lancashire colliery, No. 11, of the Lehigh and Wilkesbarre Coal Company, at Plymouth, Penn., Thursday, five men were instantly killed and five others seriously injured. All except four hundred dollars of the seventy thousand dollars stolen from the mineral Range train on Friday last has been recovered, and seven persons are under arrest in connection with the robbery.


