DETROIT TAKES TWO GAMES PHILADELPHIA LOSES ONE

By Winning Both Games of Yesterday's Double Header with Boston, the White Philadelphia Dropped a Game to Chicago, Detroit Advances One Stage Nearer the American League Pennant--Champions Clinch Title if Remaining Games of Series Are Taken.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 29.—Detroit, by winning both games of a double header from Boston today, the first 5 to 0, and the second 8 to 3, while Philadelphia was breaking even with Chicago, now has a lead of three and one-half games over its nearest contender for the pennant, and the champions have but to win their two remaining games here to make sure of the title for this season.

Karger took Arellanes' place in the second inning and did fair work. Three passes and a single in the fourth inning gave Detroit its other two runs. The home players never looked dangerous. One unfortunate incident was the crippling of Schmitt. He was hit on the head by a swift inshoot in the fifth inning, and although not badly hurt, had to leave the game. After resting over one day, Schmitt started in the second game for the visitors, being opposed by Cleoite. Boston scored a run in the first inning by good hitting, three singles coming in a row, with two runs and a man on second in the fifth inning, a passed ball by Donahue that let the run in seemed to unnerve Cleoite, and two bases on balls and four singles followed, giving Detroit a 5-0 lead.

Native Bell Smashes World's Record For 2 Year Old Filies

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 29.—Native Bell, owned by Edward Thomson, of Northport, L. I., and driven by Thomas W. Murphy, won the world's record for two year trotting filies today, and tied with Transplant for the world's honors for trotters of that age, of both sexes. It was in the second heat of the horse review futurity's final division that the filly trotted so well.

Murphy took the youngster far out in front in the record mile and let her trot at will until 200 yards from the finish. Then, instead of urging her on, the driver held Native Bell back and took her to the finish jogging. Had a hard trial been made, the Transplant mark made two years ago at Lexington, with Murphy driving, would have been bettered. Time by Native Bell, 2:09.4.

WHEAT MARKET DEPRESSED

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 29.—An official estimate showing a larger acreage of wheat in Argentina than had been generally conceded has been depressing effect on the wheat market here and offset the effect of the congested condition in the September delivery. Prices at the close were 1 1/8 higher to 1 1/8 lower. Corn was exceedingly weak and closed at net losses of 1 1/8 to 1 3/4. Oats were irregular, the September delivery advancing more than 2 cents and the deferred months declining 1 cent. Provisions were weak.
