Practical Advice For Poultry Raisers
Government Expert Tells of Profits that May be Realized Under Proper Conditions -- Care of Fowls.

Harcourt, June 28.—The practical character and great value of the addresses being delivered by the speakers at the agricultural demonstration train now touring the province may be judged from the following synopsis of the talk given by Seth Jones at Harcourt on Thursday to an audience composed almost wholly of women. Following his inspection of the poultry exhibit the women assembled in one of the cars and Mr. Jones introduced his subject by remarking upon the unsatisfied market there was right at home for all the poultry products that the province could raise for many years. New Brunswick, instead of exporting eggs and poultry is importing thousands of dollars worth every year and the demand is increasing. One subject sought by the Department of Agriculture was to interest the people and stimulate them in this pleasant and profitable branch of farming. As our farms are at present conducted the care of the hens and poultry is left to the women. It is light, pleasant and when rightly carried on yields great profits. The first essential is quality in poultry raising as in other things. It costs no more to keep a first class hen that will lay a profit on her eggs than it does to have an unprofitable one. It is just as easy and as cheap to raise chickens that will bring \$1.25 in the market as it is to raise one that will sell for only half a dollar.

The main thing is to start right and with the right type of hen. New Brunswick farmers should adopt and breed the general purpose hen—the Plymouth Rock, the Wyandott and the Rhode Island Red. Either of these breeds will give satisfactory results and good profits. They will produce a large number of eggs and will make good broilers and roasters that bring highest prices in the markets. One thing he would impress upon the farmers—whatever breed of poultry you start with, stick to that breed. Your neighbor says that his hens are paying better than yours or because some other breed takes more prizes at exhibitions than does that kind you are keeping. This does not mean that you are not to introduce new stock into your flock, but that you are to have new stock frequently at least every two years, and every year is better—up order to keep up the quality of your flock. Get the best birds possible of the breed which you are raising and stick to that breed.

A Mortgage Raiser.
A good flock of hens is a "mortgage raiser," as many farmers have demonstrated. After you have decided upon the breed then it is necessary to have a secure place in which to keep your flock. In the past too little attention has been given to the poultry house and the result has been that they have been kept too warm and with too little ventilation. A hen is a warm blooded creature and she needs a warm house, a cool, well ventilated place in order to thrive. Correct and adequate ventilation is the problem that has been time and time again the cause of failure. The latest and best approved method of constructing a poultry house is with a straw loft. Have a good sized window in each gable and lay boards across the top plates and cover this floor with a thick layer of clean straw.

THE SUPREME COURT DENIES REHEARING OF THE EDDY CASE

Concord, N. H., June 28.—A rehearing in the case involving the legality of the reburial of the body of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, founder of the Christian Science Church, to the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Boston, was denied by the Supreme Court today.
The suit was originally brought in the Superior Court by Mrs. Eddy's son, George J. Glover of Israel, S. D., seeking to have the reburial declared void and the residue of the Eddy estate, valued at about \$2,000,000, placed in trust for Mrs. Eddy's adopted son, Dr. Ebenezer J. Foster Eddy of Waterbury, Vt. This was referred to the Supreme Court for determination of the points of law involved. The Supreme Court recently ruled that the reburial was legal and did not conflict with statutes quoted by the plaintiffs limiting the size of bequests to churches.

Warm Meals Dangerous.
A warm meal overheats the food and she is then more likely to take cold. Give the heartiest meal of the day before the food is to be eaten, about an hour before dinner. This should consist of grain, scraps from the kitchen and dining table and a liberal quantity of fruit. A hen cannot digest her food nor produce eggs unless she has plenty of clean grit along with her food. Give her plenty of clean, fresh cold water at least twice a day. Sour milk is a splendid food for hens. The milk is best if beneficial to the milk and the other food, will largely take the place of meat. Do not give her much sweet milk.
