AROUND THE CITY

Big Engine Arrives.

The forty ton turbine which is to be placed in the power house of the St. John Railway Company, arrived in the city and the task of removing it from the siding to the power house was begun last evening. The turbine is the largest in the city, and is over 2,000 horse power. The present turbine in the power house is 500 horse power.

Purchase Farm

Messrs. Alfred Burley & Co. have completed the purchase of the Bonnell farm situated at Public Landing. The farm consists of 100 acres with house, barns and orchard, and has a beautiful river frontage of thirty-two rods and commands a splendid view of the Long Reach. The purchaser is Captain William Nichol, who, with his family, has taken possession.

Sackville Stone Best.

A fact of interest to New Brunswick people was told The Standard last evening by Mr. Pickard, manager of the Sackville Freestone Company. It appears that when tenders were being called for the construction of the terminals for the car ferry to Prince Edward Island tests were made of stone taken from quarries in different parts of the province. Under these tests the Sackville stone stood best, and is now being used in the work.

Good Market in West.

Included in yesterday's visitors to the city were Charles Fawcett and Fred Ryan of Sackville. Mr. Fawcett speaking of business conditions generally observed that the noticeable feature of this year's trade has been the continued growth of the western market. It is in the prairie provinces rather than in the east that the time manufacturers in his opinion, must look hereafter for customers for the major portion of their output. Indeed the west has been so successful upon as the principal market, thus bearing out the old contention that these provinces must do the manufacturing for the farmers of the west.

EXPECT ARREST TO COME SOON IN ROSE CASE

Police may Arrest Coward who Attempted Life of Italian—Still in Dangerous Condition.

At the hands of the police the mysteries surrounding the cowardly assault on Tony Rose, who now lies in a precarious condition in the General Public Hospital, are said to be solved to an extent which in the eyes of those working on the case fastens the guilt on a certain individual and within a short time it is understood an arrest will be made.

Showing slight signs of improvement but in a condition still considered critical, the victim lies in the hospital, unable to give a connected story of the cowardly attempt on his life.

From the statements of some of Rose's neighbors it is gathered that the result of the assault was on the most friendly terms with those of the neighborhood with whom he came in among his countrymen, but from another source it is learned that some time ago trouble arose between Rose and another Italian with whom he had previously been friendly terms. A certain action on the part of this man brought on words and a quarrel ensued.

Since the break in the friendship of the two foreigners it is understood that a bitter hatred was held against Rose, not only by his former friend, but by others as well. It is believed that the action of last Monday evening was the result of a premeditated plan to waylay Rose and possibly do away with him.

Detective Killen and Deputy Chief Jenkins were working on the case yesterday and last evening and as a result of their investigation it is understood have a clue which will result in arrests.

While the police refuse to discuss the case it is said that a certain Italian is under suspicion and an arrest will shortly follow.

 aid, the grand old chieftain of the Conservative Party, and the greatest of Canadians.

Rumors Denied.
 "I understand that during the last few weeks friends of mine in St. John, I do not mean political ones, have been appointing me to different positions in the gift of the Government, and have been suggesting that no matter what happens I am not interested in the welfare of St. John any longer, as I will soon be appointed to a position of emolument and honor in the gift of the Crown."

"I understand that I have been disposed of in different ways, that I have been nominated in St. John by these gentlemen for the position of High Commissioner for Canada in London, for a judgeship in the Supreme Court of Canada, and for the honorable position of Chief Justice of New Brunswick."

"These are all positions to which any man might honorably and fairly aspire, but I desire to say to you, my good friends of the Conservative Party in New Brunswick, who are sitting around these tables tonight, that although I am becoming somewhat of a veteran in politics, having run my first election for the House of Assembly over 28 years ago, and have been actively and continually engaged in politics ever since, that there is no position that appeals to me so strongly as that of a representative of my native province in the highest parliament of our land."

His Splendid Record.
 "During the years that I have been engaged in active political life, over 28 of which I have passed in Parliament or in the Legislature, I have given to my party and my province, and

to the country in which I live, the very best that was in me. My ambition has been to serve my country and to improve its government. No doubt during the course of that time I have made mistakes, for to err is human, but any mistakes that have been made have been mistakes of judgment and not of intention, and I can look you who have stood by me so loyally and so well, in the face here tonight and say with all sincerity that I have done nothing in my political life of which I am ashamed, that I have been loyal to my constituents and my party, and that when the time comes, as come it must, when I will retire from the active work of politics, I will do so with a feeling of satisfaction that I have discharged the duties of the positions to which I have been called by my fellow citizens, conscientiously and to the best of my ability, and with a sincere and patriotic desire to serve faithfully and well the people of the province who have reposed such a generous confidence in me in the past."

"I have no desire or thought of being put on the shelf for some years to come, and so long as I am blessed with the health which I now possess, and the energy and capacity for work, which I enjoy, so long as my leader desires my presence in the Government which he leads so ably, and with such acceptability to the people of this country and the people of the Empire, and so long as the Conservatives of the province desire me to stay in the political arena and continue to repose in me the confidence they have so unflinchingly given me, I shall so long as I remain in Parliament to serve their interests and help advance the good not only of our city and province, but of the Dominion of Canada, and of the British Empire, of which, in common with all Canadian citizens we are so proud of forming a part."

HON. ROBERT ROGERS GIVES ASSURANCE OF FACILITIES

In view of the lack of grain elevators for the movement of Canadian grain it would not be an exaggeration to say that the most modern type of elevator on one of the new piers. We would recommend an elevator of three or four million bushel capacity with ten to fifteen apiece to unload direct into steamships.

In order to meet the requirements of passenger traffic we would suggest that berth No. 1 should be taken over from the City of St. John and fitted up as a modern passenger dock with modern accommodation for all classes of passengers.

Of Best Material.

In the building of new docks and warehouses, we would recommend that they be of most modern construction, excluding hemlock, and considering the greater length of steamships these new piers should be at least 1,000 feet long, but preserving sufficient ground between the dock and the other railways. In order to accomplish this, dredging in further to the shore would be necessary to be between the Dominion Government, Canadian Pacific Railway and the City of St. John would require to be amended to conform with the recommendation.

We would also request your government to proceed with the construction of the new dock in accordance with the agreement with the Canadian Pacific Railway, in order that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company may without delay construct their yard room, terminals, etc.

We wish to call your attention to the fact that the new docks now under construction, and being constructed on the West Side are far behind, and the work has unnecessarily been delayed by the contractors. We recommend that the balance of their contract be cancelled and the government finish the dock appliances, cranes, etc., and that the dock appliances, cranes, etc., shall be of the most modern type for handling cargo.

We also recommend that the extension of the Negropole breakwater to the island, for which an appropriation has already been made, be pushed forward without delay. Also that the breakwater be built on the northeast side of Partridge Island, extending in a northeasterly direction to the island rocks. That on the end of this breakwater a small lighthouse be built with a machine bell, which would take the place of the gas buoy and light station now in the harbor, and would render more safe the berths now being constructed at Sand Point and also the proposed deep water berths on the south of Sand Point.

The Steam Lane.

In view of the large number of steamers that are traversing the Bay of Fundy, and owing to the fact that the soundings in the so-called steam lane, that is, east side of lane, McCoy Head to Northwest Lodge to Lurchee Shoal or Lightship, thence west (true) 10 degrees; thence northward to Briar Island, abeam 10 degrees; thence to Old Proprietor; thence to Musquash (Split Rock), are not correct, and therefore misleading to ships running a line of soundings in foggy weather, we would recommend that you instruct the department to run continuous parallel lines of soundings, reporting on the nature of the bottom through this steam lane, and make the lane for the purpose of these soundings one mile wide.

These recommendations are made in view of the lack of facilities for meeting the requirements of the trade which is knocking at our doors, and which we are assured by steamship and railway men cannot be built too quickly to prevent the congestion which has occurred for the past two years.

As regards the work now under contract in Courtney Bay to Norton Griffiths Company, we wish to point out that statements have been made that the Norton Griffiths Company can be assisted to do so complete their contract within two years instead of the contract period. The fact remains

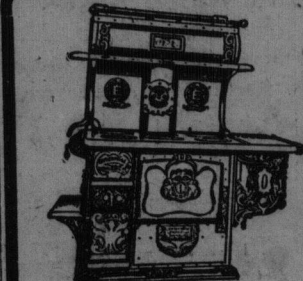
