DR. A. B. WALKER'S LECTURE.

There was a fair audience at the McChesney Institute last evening and those present were given a rare treat in the lecture delivered by Dr. A. B. Walker.

Dr. A. B. Walker, the next speaker, said he felt it his duty to speak on the subject of the colored people in Canada and the United States today, and the possible future of their condition prior to the civil war and the freedom of the slaves.

Dr. Walker, the lecturer of the evening, was warmly greeted by the audience.

Speaking of the Boers as a people, George Flegen, who has been in South Africa many years, said that they are the craftiest, most dishonest, most untruthful and most cruel and most ignorant race of white people in the world.

As to the impositions placed on the Uitlanders he said that nineteen-twentieths of the taxes were paid by them, at the same time they were denied the more of citizens. The money they paid in, he was sorry to say, was appropriated to the purchase of guns, rifles and ammunition to murder the white man.

Boer sympathizers, he said, were wont to liken the war to the struggle for independence in America in 1776. The lecturer made a written declaration, while Kruger's ultimatum had been a model of insolence and discourtesy and without the slightest pretence of equitable compromise.

The English flag, he said, had always stood for liberty. It stood for liberty on the plains of Abraham; at Trafalgar; at Waterloo; and it stands today for liberty at Omdurman. It stands for liberty today and will stand for liberty until the last battle is fought and won in the Transvaal. (Great applause.)

Continuing, the speaker said, as for Kruger, the handwriting on the wall portends his fate. His boat will soon be full. He himself will go to the island of St. Helena, and share the same fate as Napoleon Bonaparte.

At the close, Mr. Molison moved a vote of thanks which was heartily endorsed by all present.

The lecture was greatly enjoyed by all and the speaker was frequently interrupted by applause.

A Conservative Elected on the Strength of Speaking French-Liberals Elected in Winnipeg and Lotbiniere.

Ottawa, Jan. 25.—The returns from Sherbrooke give McIntosh 90 majority, which will be reduced when complete figures are received.

This was a family contest, the Conservatives not being able to put up a candidate, as was the case also at Winnipeg.

SBERILITY OF FLOWED LAND.

The injury to soil from flooding by a high tide in various estuaries is said to be a loss of \$200,000. A late investigation in Essex, Eng., showed that the soil was left with two per cent of salt, twice the normal amount, but that the damage was probably due to the complete destruction of earthworms.
