The Story of a Respectable Thief.

General the Honorable Benjamin F.

Butler, member of Congress, has distinguished himself

by defying and professing to

defy the press. It was to be expected

that the opposition of the press to him

as Benjamin. It is quite the thing

bill. The bill as passed, provided

for the payment of \$5,000 to each

member of both Houses of Congress

from \$5,000 to \$7,500 a year, taking

effect two years before its passage, and

it doubled the salary of the President

and increased that of the Supreme Court

Justices. The press, of course, de-

nounced the measure with almost

unbroken voice. There were few

to support it because the President ap-

proved it. If those Canadian journals

that profess to approve of Mackenzie's

proposed extension of the Northern

Pacific had been in the States, and in

the administration interest, the Salary

bill would have been passed.

The Market Committee reported

recommending that certain tenants in the

The Harbor Committee recommended

The Special Committee on vaccination

compulsory. The report of the committee

Act.

The Auditors' Report on the Public

Schools Accounts was received, showing

the entire amount received from various

sources since last audit to have been \$71,-

032.85; amount of expenditure \$64,690-

86; leaving a balance on hand of \$6,341-

96. The total number of scholars in opera-

tions in 43, with 48 departments and 51

teachers. The number of pupils enrolled

during the first term of the year was 4,-

231, during the second 4,060. The de-

crease is due to the closing of the schools

at the end of the year.

A petition from Matthew Tappan

requesting a retaining wall was referred to

the Street Committee. Another from J. C.

Wood asking damages done at the hay-

market was treated in the same way.
