London, Nov. 18.—Further attempts by the enemy to force crossings of the Piave River were frustrated by the Italian forces yesterday, and in a brilliant counter-attack the Austro-German forces which previously had gained a footing on the west bank of the Fagare zone were completely swept out of this area, the War Office announced to-day.
