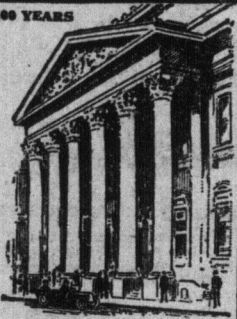

Committee to solicit members: J.A. Schroeder and W.O. Robertson.

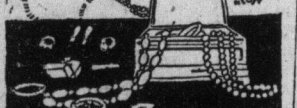

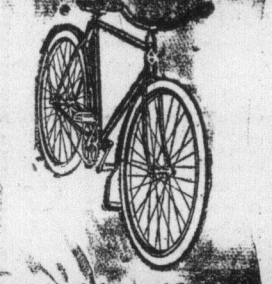
