The Treaty

Jan Christian Smuts, Premier of the Union of South Africa, in presenting the peace treaty to the Union Parliament asked, not for approval of the document, but for ratification. As Smuts himself signed the peace treaty after voicing strong objections, his course must commend itself as consistent. All that is asked of any country is ratification, and while ratification implies approval in the largest sense, it does not imply approval with every last item of the agreement. Smuts signed the agreement because he regarded it as the best attainable not because he considered it a perfect document. South Africa endorsed his action as Canada and the United States and other countries should endorse the action of those who acted as their agents in the deliberations. The Canadian Commons in ratifying the treaty also took the consistent course, upholding our treaty representa-

ment which guarantees the future peace of the world as it can only be guaranteed through the League of Nations.

Customs of Ancient Inns

Abroad, where many quaint and curious hotels, taverns and inns of respectable antiquity abound, it is natural to find numerous odd customs. For instance, there is an inn in a town on the Rhine wherein whenever a patron is heard to swear he must place a coin equivalent to the bar on the counter.

Until recent years there was a most respectable inn in Warwickshire, the proprietor of which was accustomed to invite all his patrons to accompany him and his wife on Sunday morning to a church directly opposite the inn. On returning from service each customer was expected to partake of refreshments offered by the

hospitable landlord free of charge. Those who put up at one hotel in Edinburgh obtain, if they are accustomed to the ways of the place, a first-hand knowledge of the Scottish disposition. Patrons of this hotel must remember to keep their shoes or boots in their rooms over night, otherwise their footwear will be blacked, regardless of its original color.

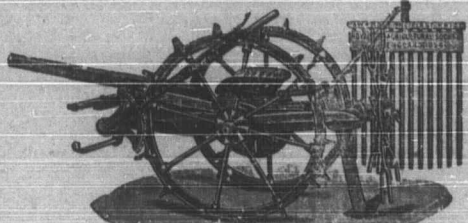
