KILLED SISTER.

New York, Oct. 17.—Wm. Joyce and his wife, who had been married seven months, were asphyxiated to death night at the home of Mrs. Joyce's parents, in Brooklyn. Joseph Duff, 19 years old, brother of Mrs. Joyce, believes he was the unintentional cause of the tragedy.

Mr. and Mrs. Joyce, who lived in Manhattan, had spent the evening at the home of the Duffs, and were asked to remain over night. They were given the sleeping room usually occupied by Joseph Duff, who was away from home during the evening. When the young man went to his home and lit the gas Joyce spoke to him and explained the situation, whereupon Joseph turned out the gas and went to another apartment to sleep.

He thinks that in his confusion at finding his room occupied he may have turned on the gas after the light had been extinguished. There is absolutely no ground for suspicion of suicide. The grief of young Duff is overwhelming.

MESSANGER MISSING.

New York, October 17.—Geo. Armitage, a messenger at the New Amsterdam National bank in this city, has been missing since Tuesday. When he disappeared he had with him \$50,000 in checks and drafts. According to the Commercial Advertiser of this afternoon the bank officials believe that he has been foully dealt with. Armitage had been in the bank's service for some time and had always been found reliable and punctual.

On Tuesday he went out to collect on checks and drafts received by his bank, the sum being variously stated at from \$25,000 to \$50,000. He failed to return to the bank, and has not been seen since. This morning the bank officers received by express the bank's wallet, which Armitage had carried, containing all the missing checks and drafts except \$5,996.58, which may be actual cash or negotiable paper.

It is argued by the officers that if Armitage had absconded he would never have returned the wallet. On

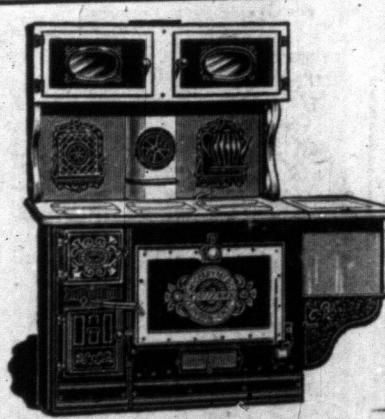

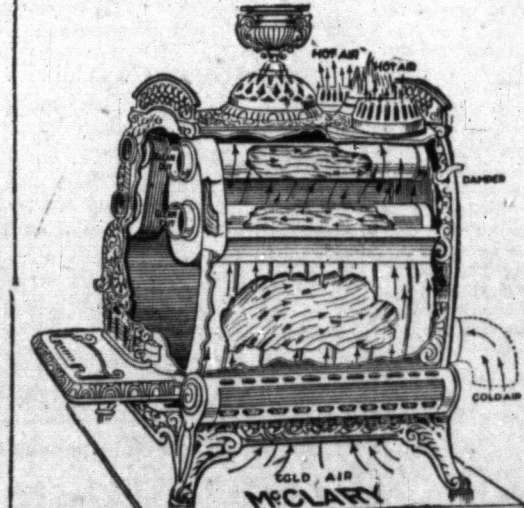
