#### MUNICIPAL CHANGES

Mayor Cowan leaves this evening for Toronto on civic business. A meeting of municipal delegates from several cities of Ontario will be held in Toronto to-morrow evening, when they will organize and appear before the Leg'slature the fol-lowing day to ask for certain amendments in the Municipal Act.

ments in the Municipal Act.

One of the amendments asked for is that municipal corporations shall not be civilly responsible for damages in respect to accidents on public highways and that section 600 be amended to read as follows:

"Every public road, street, bridge and bighway shall be kept in repair by the corporation, and in default of the corporation so to keep in repair, the corporation so to keep in repair, the corporation shall be liable to any punishment provided by law."

This would strike out the clause which is it present added to the section,

which is at present added to the section,
"And shall be civilly responsible for all damages sustained by any person by reason of such default and that action must be taken within three months after the damage is sustained."

Other questions will come up, such as snow and ice on sidewalks, and another amendment to the Municipal Act placing the police under the control of the Council in cities of less than 20,000 inhabitants and thus deing away with police commissioners.

#### Edinburgh Castle.

Edinburgh Castle.

The Castle of Edinburgh was undoubtedly the foundation of the old town of Edinburgh and is the oldest building in it. Though there is no doubt that it was rebuilt by Edwin as a Northumbrian fortress in 626, for nearly four centuries later its history is obscure, and only becomes clear again with the reign of Malcolm II., in 1004. One of the great names in connection with it is that of St. Margaret, the plous and beautiful Queen of Malcolm III., whose little chapel in the castle is perhaps the oldest ecclesiastical memorial in Scotland. It was restored in 1853. In subsequent centuries the castle was repeatedly taken and retaken by Scots and English, being last taken by Cromwell in 1650. In 1745 Prince Charles Edward Stuart attempted it; since that date it has been undisturbed as a garrison of the British Government.

# Thursdays, there will be night sessions of the House. The detailed estimates for the year were handed out by the provincial treasurer yesterday. As shown by the extract of expenditures which was laid on the table Friday, the total amount required is \$5,073,785.52, of which \$4,545,-845.25 is for current expenditure, \$367,-845.25 is for current expenditure, \$367,-845.27 on capital account, and \$166,300 for other purposes. The expenditures last year xmounted to \$5,267,453. All the departments show increases for salaries except the education department, which shows a decrease of \$400. The amount required for legislation is \$137,-856, as compared with \$190,550 a year ago, there being a decrease of \$2000 in the indemnity and mileagre paid to members. The assistant clerk receives an increase of \$100. The expenses of the select committee on assessment and public utilities last year amounted to \$2700, and this will not be required this year. There is an increase of about \$5000 in the cost of administering justice in the province. Allowances to judges of the supreme court require \$17,000, as compared with \$15,000 a year ago. Increase for Education. For education there is asked \$1.198,-846.51, an increase of \$110,815.28. Some of this increase is due to the transferring of the institutes for the deaf, dumb Add hind team the deaf, dumb Add hind team the cost of the second.

For education there is asked \$1.198, 540.51, an increase of \$110,815.28. Soms of this increase is due to the transferring of the institutes for the deaf, dumb and blind from the public institutions and maintenance account. The Believille Institute requires \$50,803, and the Brantford Institute \$24,829. For public and separate schools, the amount required is \$531,358.96, as against \$512,683.43; there is an increase of \$15,300 for high schools and collegiate institutes: an increase of \$2,885.33 for the departmental library and museum; an increase of \$20,650 for the School of Practical Intervals, and the Science; a decrease of \$3500 for public libraries, art schools, etc.; an increase of \$361,511.14 for the provincial university and mining schools. There is a vote of \$10,000 towards rebuilding the Ottawa University. This vote was promised by the late government.

The sum of \$12,600 is included for the purchase of sub-targets for cadet corps under contract of 1904.

New Expenditures.

Salaries and maintenance of the new Macdonald Institute at Guelph call for an expenditure of \$23,000. This is a new vote, and under the head of agriculture there is a new item of \$25,000 for erecting and equipping a building for farm mechanics and implement demonstrations.
