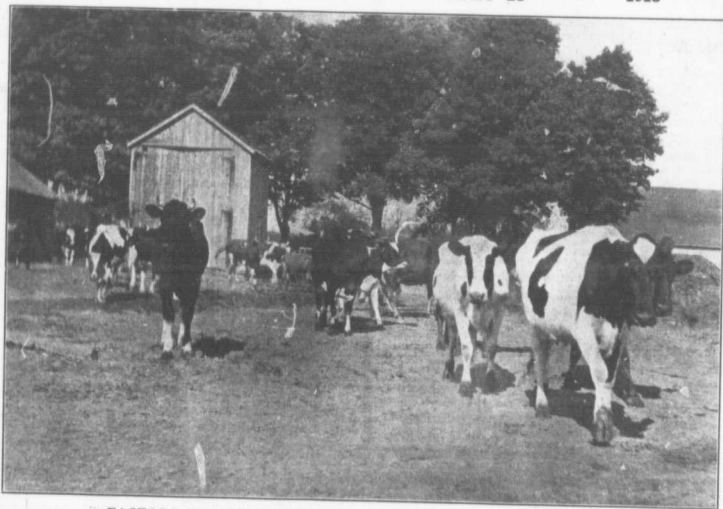

FACTORS IN ACCOUNTING FOR SUCCESS ON A RENTED FARM

Mr. J. W. Allan, Oxford Co., Ont., is a tenant farmer with a formidable yearly rental to meet. But he is making good. His 54 milch cows, a few of which may be seen, form almost his sole source of income. Their total production is 1200 to 1700 lbs. of milk a day. That is the secret of Mr. Allan's success—good cows. Progressive dairying is better for the renter and better for the farm than the system of cropping and land "skinning" too frequently practiced by tenant farmers.
