York, January 26th, 1827.

SIR,

In conformity to the 30th Chapter of the Acts of the Legislature of this Province, passed at its last Session, I have now the honor of enclosing to you, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and the Legislature, a statement of the funds in my hands, for erecting the Monument on Queenston Heights, to the memory of the late Major General Sir Isaac Brock, K.B. In doing this, I am sorry, that I am not now able to make a final close of my Agency in the business, which has been caused by the Contractors having other engagements on hand that prevented their giving so much of their attention to the Monument as might have been expected.

I have however to say, that the Monument has been carried to its destined height, and finished apparently as contracted for, though not yet finally taken off the Contractor's hands.

To make it complete, the inscription, a fence around it, and a Statue on the top, are wanting; all which will be attended to so far as I am able.
