Colony is Happy At the Success

By Special Wire to the Courier WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Sir Edward Grey, Minister of Foreign Affairs for Great Britain, sent this message to the embassy here today: "The government and people of Australia have telegraphed expressing their intense admiration of the gallant manner in which the troops have acquitted themselves. 'Their splendid valor,' the telegram concludes, 'has made us proud of the grand old flag.'"

It is reported, according to the published dispatch, that their resignations have been tendered.

LITTLE LEFT OF THE PATHFINDER AFTER EXPLOSION

Terrible Devastation When Scout Cruiser Struck German Mine.

ACCIDENT HAPPENED OFF SCOTCH COAST Late Report Says That Fifty of the Crew of About Two Hundred and Fifty Were Saved LONDON, Sept. 8.—It is learned on reliable authority that the captain and 80 of the crew of the British scout cruiser Pathfinder, which was sunk by a German mine in the North Sea, have been saved. The crew of the Pathfinder numbered about 280. The destruction of the Pathfinder occurred about 4 o'clock on Saturday afternoon at a point 10 miles northwest of Saint Abb's Head, Scotland. While she was patrolling the coast, the cruiser struck a mine which exploded near her magazine, blowing her 10 miles distant felt the shock. From Eyemouth, 14 miles from the scene of the explosion, a huge cloud of smoke was visible on the horizon. A torpedo boat destroyer was the first to reach the scene. She was followed by the St. Abb's motor lifeboat.

BLOWN TO PIECES

The Pathfinder was literally blown to pieces and the sea was strewn with the wreckage. The devastating effect of the explosion of the Pathfinder is emphasized in the report of Coxswain Nisbet, of the Saint Abb's motor lifeboat. He says that for a mile and a half the water was strewn with wreckage of every kind in a most complete description. There was little of the pieces that was larger than a man's leg. In the midst of the debris he found a ship's Bible floating in the water. According to official announcement the casualties among the officers were eight missing, one seriously wounded and slightly wounded.

AID COMES QUICKLY

SEVERAL DAYS

Battle Between Austrians and Russians is a Serious Affair.

LONDON, Sept. 8, 10.50 a.m.—A despatch from Rome to the Exchange Telegraph Company says: "A telegram from Vienna states that General Ruzsky, who following the capture of Lemburg executed a flank attack northward against the Austrians under General Auffenberg, the Austrian war minister, is to-day engaged in a desperate attempt to annihilate Auffenberg's army. The battle has already continued three days and is likely to continue several more."

GERMANY'S NAVY

To be Immediately Strengthened by Building New Craft.

LONDON, Sept. 8.—A despatch to the Express from Amsterdam says, according to a Berlin despatch, statements made by members of the Reichstag on the subject of naval expansion, point to the building of twelve torpedo boat divisions, six airship divisions, a number of mine layers and other craft. The rapid construction of three large warships and two smaller cruisers is also advocated.
