Washington, Aug. 24.—The Chinese Legation here had not been apprised of the latest attack upon A merican missions by the Chinese fanatics near Foo-Chow until shown the Associated Press despatch bringing the news. It is freely admitted at the Legation that in the present state of feeling in China, growing out of the ignorance and prejudices of the natives, and especially because of the recent war, all foreigners in the interior of China are in more or less danger. Hope is expressed at the Legation that the missionaries will recognize this estate of things and will seek the treaty ports until the excitement subsides and normal conditions are restored.

The timost confidence is expressed at the Legation of the intention of the Chinese Imperial Government to protect the Christian missions as far as possible, and the last edict from the Emperor, issued within the past ten days, is quoted as evidence of this intention. A quite full synopsis of this document has been received by cable at the Legation, it is entirely in the interest of the Christians, and directed especially to the high Chinese officials. They are asked to see that the times. The edict also commands the lower officials and the people generally to observe this helicity, and closes by saying any violation of the order will be severely punished. Confidence is also carpessed at the Legation into the recent rots, and it is believed there that as soon as the Imperial will can be made known the American and English Consuls will be admitted to the hearings.
