The Country Expects Them to ba Brought on Very Soon.

London, September 17. - The closthe war are watched with a feeling of utter apathy and indifference in London. Military comment has ceased, and with one consent the clubs and drawing-rooms are preoccupied with the election talk. The Liberal leader has finally made an appointment for a speech in Scotland late in this month. His party, while badly demoralized, is pulling itself together for the general elections under Herbert Gladstone's coaching, but will not waste its resources by contesting hopeless dis-tricts. Some excellent candidates are coming forward on the Liberal side. Sir Edward Reed is one, and Anthony Hope Hawkins is another. The Government shows no sign that the elecernment shows no sign that the elec-tions are close at hand, but it is not neglecting any opportunity for em-phasizing the importance of the battle for the unity of the Empire. The arrangements made for the reception in London of picked representatives of the body of colonial volunteers and of the body of colonial volunteers and their review of the Queen are well calculated to inspire loyalty throughout the Empire. The signal for the dissolution of Parliament is expected early next week, when the Queen's decision can be learned at the Privy Council. She will follow Lord Salishury's advice without doubt but will bury's advice without doubt, but will have a decisive voice on one ques-tion of the first importance. This wil relate to Lord Salisbury's own position in the cabinet. If he be weary of public life and anxious to spend the remainder of his days in well-earned retirement, there will never be a beter opportunity for rounding out his career. The Queen will be able to retain his service by expressing her unwillingness to have him retire. She can also lighten his official burdens
