The dead man had some money and it is believed this led to his murder. The story was told to Edward R. McSweeny, assistant commissioner of immigration and he said it was absolutely untrue. "I know of no murder mystery at the barge office," he said. "If the body of a man has been found there I would know it. Isadors Termini, an Italian, aged 65 years, who came to this country as an immigrant last spring, has been missing since he reached this port. My theory is that he arrived at the barge office in the afternoon when it was quite dans and that he was put aboard the railroad barge instead of the one bound for Ellis island.

"The railroad barge cassies immigrants who have been released and who are bound up the state to the place where they are to take a train to reach their destination. If the man got on the train he probably was put off somewhere between here and Buffalo as he and no ticket and no money to buy a ticket. We have tried to learn the whereabout of the man and have failed."

P., cables from Paris to the Journal, saying: "It is a unique testi-mony to the great individuality of President Kruger that his voyage to Europe is watched with more intense interest by the continental press than is the progress of the war in China. is the progress of the war in China. The daily calculations of the speed of the Gelderland, with its illustrious passenger, have two main inspirations, namely: Curjosity as to what the indomitable president may say for his people and against England when he lands at Marseilles and the probable effect of this on the attitude of the European powers and the military policy of the British in the further

resecution of the war.
"All speculation agrees on coints: There are to be important revelations. In one well-informed quarter it is asserted that Chamberlain will soon have an opportunity of read-ing private letters found in Johannesburg that will place the active complacity of the colonial office in the Jamieson raid beyond further dispute. The Gelderland will stop at Port Said only to receive despatches, and will proceed in a few hours to Marseilles, where she is expected to arrive Nov .19. Kruger is not likely to publish any statement until after consulting the members of the Boer government already in Europe, all of whom will meet him on landing.
