CORSETS FOR THE NOSE.

Beauty Doctor Much in Demand in London Society.

The "smart" set in society and their followers in humble life will do almost anything to "improve" their personal appearance. Cutting dimples has been quite the rage for some time past, and the writer knows that "dimple-cutters" in the west end have been doing quite a big business during the present season. Ladies who never dreamed of having dimples before have now got what they think admirable specimens upon the face and neck. What will happen when dimples go out of fashion it is difficult to surmise, but no doubt the "beauty doctors" will be able to make the necessary repairs.

Our contemporary, the Medical Press and Circular, in its current issue deals with another of the latest novelties in this direction. It emanates, like other things of the kind, from Paris and is a "special corset for the nose." It is readily conceivable that prolonged and severe pressure for the correction of a supposed malformation may be most injurious under certain circumstances, while it is questionable if mere alteration in position would have the slightest effect in removing a "bottle" nose or in overcoming a chronic rosacea. To the practice our medical contemporary applies this sledgehammer denunciation:

"To lower the art of surgery to the level of mere facial beautification may be sometimes undignified, but to tamper with the anatomical outlines of the human countenance is one of the most insidious forms of quackery when undertaken by unskilled hands and for the sake of pampering a foolish vanity."—London News.

Tea Drinking.

Mr. Donald N. Reid's protest against tea drinking in Ireland and elsewhere is of more importance than might appear to the uninitiated. Tea, like any other nerve stimulant, is good for men and women if taken in moderation and when properly made. As drunk in Ireland and in some of our colonies, notably Australia, it is as harmful as undiluted alcohol. I have heard of many cases of tea intoxication in the back blocks of Australia. The colonist does not make fresh tea every time he wants a cup, and he wants many per diem, but puts new leaves on the old, and in the course of a few days the concoction is one of tannin. He ruins both his digestion and his nerves.—London Saturday Review.

Turkish Salaries.

A Turkish ministerial portfolio is a sort of gold mine to the holder. It is not the vizier, however, who holds the richest claim, though his salary of £13,250 a year, which is also that of the war minister, looks princely to western eyes. The "plum" of Turkish offices is the admiralty, which is worth £16,800 a year, and the present holder is stated to have amassed a fortune of £2,400,000. The minister of foreign affairs has £8,800, and finance comes next with a thousand lower. The lowest salary is that of the minister of mines, though it is rather higher than that of the premier of England. The sum is £5,500.—London Globe.

Uncle Sam's Wealth.

With 7 per cent of the world's land area and 5 per cent of its population the United States has 25 per cent of the world's wealth. The value of the United States property, real and personal, in 1900 was \$94,000,000,000 as compared with \$59,000,000,000 for Great Britain and Ireland, \$48,000,000,000 for France, \$45,000,000,000 for Germany, \$32,000,000,000 for Russia, \$22,000,000,000 for Austria-Hungary, \$15,000,000,000 for Italy and \$12,000,000,000 for Spain. Moreover, the United States' lead is increasing faster than is her preponderance over them all (except Russia and China) in population.

Austria's Kaiser, Hungary's King.

The Austrian kaiser has many an odd custom to comply with in his capacity as dual monarch of Austria-Hungary. He is emperor of the former, but king of the latter. Hungarian papers, people and politicians never breathe the word "kaiser" in referring to Francis Joseph, but only the Hungarian "kiraly" or king.

When the sovereign leaves Vienna to visit Budapest, he must cease to be Austrian and become Hungarian. His uniform will be Hungarian, also his speech, and the officials who accompany him will be Hungarians, but never Austrians.

Pleasant Lessons.

J. B. Brodie, in charge of an English school, has inaugurated a system of "pleasant lessons" to which his pupils have taken very readily. A lesson on the wooden industry is followed by a journey to a farm to witness the process of sheep shearing; the mystery of brick and tile making is made clear by a visit to the works where the pupils can see everything from the digging of the clay. The dead facts of wars are made to live again by excursions to fields of battle and descriptions of what took place upon them. Excellent results follow these practical lessons, Mr. Brodie says.

The Jefferson Bible.

After being shipped to New York to be photographed there, much to the trepidation of the officials in charge of it, the famous "Jefferson Bible" is back again at the National museum as safe and sound as ever. This book, compiled by Thomas Jefferson from clippings, is almost dropping to pieces. The compiler omitted everything of a miraculous nature, and confined his edifying to the pure teachings of Jesus.
