THE BLACK WATCH

Arrangements for the Visit to Chatham of the Famous Regiment's Bands.

The Black Watch Brass and Pipe Bands, under command of Major Bands, under command of Major Rose and the musical leadership of Bandmaster Murray will leave their headquarters in Edinburgh Castle, on August 15th next, sailing from Liverpool for Montreal, where they will strive on August 27th, proceeding then to Toronto National Exposition. They will make a four weeks' tour of the country, beginning Sept. 12th, under the direction of Mr. Stewart Houston. During this short period they will make a record tour of the country, travelling some six thousand males, or an average of two hundred and twenty miles per day in addition to two concerts every week day. In order to accomplish this feat Mr. Houston has arranged that the Band should travel by special train, living in special sleeping cars, as in many towns which they visit the hotel accomoation is not sufficient in view of the large number of excursionists who will be coming to every place where the band plays. The first week of the tour will be devoted to Western Ontario, the second week to Winnipeg and the West, the third week to Eastern Ontario, in-Ottawa and Montreal. The fourth week will find the Highlanders in the Maritime Provinces, their last concert being given at Moncton, on Saturday evening, Oct 8th, and immediately after the concert they will take the train to catch the coean liner at Bimouski the following morning.
