SUICIDE OF W. A. BALL

Despendent Over His Failure to Secure Perfect Health.

Brashed Himself Across the Wrists and Throat With a Razor at the Imperial Hotel, Edmonton, Where He Had Recently Arrived After a Visit to His Relations in Ontario - Was

His Relations in Ontario — Was Well-te-do.

Edmonton, Jan. 30.—W. A. Ball committed suicide in the Imperial Hotel Sunday by slashing himself across the wrists and throat with a razor. He went to his room as usual and shortly afterwards a heavy fall was heard by those below. The proprietor hurried upstairs, knocked, but obtained no reply. He then tried the door and finding it locked broke it open by force. Entering he found Ball lying on the floor gasping in a pool of blood, his throat cut clear through the windpipe. He died forty minutes after the alarm was given. Since venturing from the east his companions have noticed that he seemed to be very despondent.

Well-Known in Ontario.

Toronto, Jan. 30.—Arthur Ball was born in Galt and received his early education there coming to the University of Toronto about 1890 with John R. Blake, now police magistrate of Galt. He was a good sport and held a place on senior association (socker) football team of Varsity. After completing his course at the university he took a law course at Osgoode Hall. Always popular with his classmates it was with great sorrow they learned that he was suffering from pulmonary trouble and was forced to go west in search of health.

Hangs Himself.

Ottawa, Jan. 30.—Hanging from a beam in his own shed, with a stout logging chain around his neck, Patrick Foley was discovered dead by small boys about 7 o'clock, in Cantley, Que, yesterday morning. The suicide is believed to have been due to worry over epilepsy, which the unfortunate man had been afflicted since birth.

BOTH HANDS TORN OFF.
