FIRE DAMP EXPLOSION

126 Lives Believed to Be Lost in a Welsh Pit.

Disaster Is the Worst In the Colleries There Since 1894 - Heroic Efforts Have Succeeded in Recovering 68 Bodies-Hundreds of Women and Children Make Pitiful Scenes Around the Pit Mouth.

Around the Pit Meuth.

Cardiff, Wales, July 11.—An explosion of fire damp in No. 2 pit in the United National Colliery Co. at Wattstown, in the Rhondda Valley, the centre of the great Welsh coal fields, yesterday, is believed to have resulted in the loss of at least 126 lives. The first indication of the explosion was a loud-report, immediately followed by belaning of clouds of smoke and dust from the pit shaft, in which 15e men were working. The force of the explosion wrecked the machinery at the mouth of the pit.

l communication with the doomed in this direction is completely All communication with the doomed men in this direction is completely severed. No. 1 shaft, adjoining, has ordinarily afforded communication with No. 2. The 800 men in No. 1 and the few who escaped from No. 2 were drawn up. A rescue party descended, but its work was seriously impeded by the foul air and falling masses of earth dislodged by the explosion.

Altogether sixty-eight bodies have been recovered. Heroic efforts have been recovered. Heroic efforts have been remained for hours to reach the entombed men, but late last night the absence of all sound from the interior of the mine told the tale of the worst disaster that has taken place in South Wales since 1894.

The news of the explosion spread rapidly and hundreds of women and children, and thousands of men thronged the head of the pit seeking informa-

children, and thousands of men thronged the head of the pit seeking information. The mountain roadways were crowded all the afternoon and there are now streams of people in the neighborhood of the mine all contributing to the pitiful scene.

Efforts at resue were still in progress at midnight, and currents of fresh air were being driven through the shaft, but the rescuers are new working without hope of reducing the list of fatalities.
