WATCH IT!

Attracting Birds.

A great deal has been said about attracting birds, but it is really a misnomer; for birds will come around your premises do what you may to attract them or otherwise; but whether they stay or not depends on what inducements they may find for staying. Now a bird wants chiefly safety, food, water, building material and a convenient nesting site. Now if their enemies are banished they can generally find food if there has not been too profuse spraying to kill and poison all their prey. The robin can generally find construction material anywhere but he likes very much to have some coarse twine strings for binding his home together. The red-eyed vireo is especially fond of the bark of the yellow birch. I keep a few especially luscious sticks around in the orchard and have observed him using the same. Most of the smaller birds use horse hair and human hair for inside finish. It would be well for the ladies to save their hair combs and spread them on hedges or bushes and watch them fade away. All sorts of threads, hairs, cotton batting, etc., will be readily used. In putting out threads or strings do not put out any that are over eight inches long, for birds have become entangled in them and have died. Leave a pan of water of varying depth or with a few flat stones in it so they can find a suitable depth of water for bathing. A few birds like the chickadeers, tree swallows, wood-

peckers and flickers, like hollow parts of trees or boxes in which to build nests. I should be pleased to give any assistance I can to encourage any person to put forth some effort in this regard but there are others who know much better than I do about such things. C. M. GORMLEY.

Town Council.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Council on Wednesday evening Mayor Halpe and Couns. Harris, Regan, Rand and DeWitt were present.

The Committee on Finance gave a report of the receipts and expenditures for the past month.

A number of letters were read and for information concerning town matters.

The clerk read a letter from the chairman of the Natural Service Commission with references to the formation of a League here.

The following bills were read and ordered paid:

The financial condition of the town was discussed at some length and arrangements were made for the collection of overdue taxes.

The Mayor introduced the question of the Health Act now before the legislature, relative to the permanent medical officer, the general opinion being that the change in the Act was not a good one.

Kentville's Loss

Kentville lost a good citizen by the death of Mr. Fred B. Newcombe which occurred very suddenly on Friday evening of last week. He was participating in the degree work of Hiawatha Lodge, I. O. O. F., and had just completed one of his parts when he sat down and passed peacefully away.

The deceased was a man most intimately connected with every interest of the town. He was Presiding Councilor, Chairman of the School Board, for several years Warden of St. James' church and a prominent member of Hiawatha Lodge, I. O. O. F., Hiawatha Band, etc. He was indefatigable in his work for the advancement of the town's interests and business affairs.

Mr. Newcombe was born at Cornwallis on July 28th, 1856, a son of the late D. B. Newcombe. He received his early business training with the firm of R. H. White & Co., Boston. At Kentville he engaged with the firm of Beckwith & Dodge, and over twenty-five years ago started in business for himself, in what has become to be one of the largest business enterprises of the town.

He leaves a sorrowing wife and one daughter, and a younger brother and partner, Mr. E. B. Newcombe.
