A Dominion Charter, without stock subscription, was recently obtained for the establishment in the city of Ottawa of a Home, Nursery, Hospital and Kindergarten for the blind under six years of age free to all from many provinces in the Dominion. So far nothing has been done for those poor unfortunate. According to reports received from various Provincial authorities, there are at present nearly 250 in the Dominion. The late Sir Arthur Pearson, before his death, claimed that "Sunshine Home," at Chorley Wood, England, was "the only home in the Empire for blind babies." It is hoped shortly to have the SECOND in Canada. To this end money is urgently required. Help us with your generous gifts. "Least we forget: Do it now!
