THE MAYOR'S ELECTION.

The result of yesterday's contest for the office of Mayor was a personal triumph for Mr. T. C. Allen. No question of civic concern entered the contest. The friends of both candidates operated solely on the canvas of personal considerations.

The canvass, though sharp, was honorably conducted throughout, the most pleasant feature of yesterday's work being the conspicuous absence of even the slightest disposition on either side to ruff the sensibilities of opponents. It was indeed a pleasant contest.

We congratulate Mayor Allen on his emphatic victory won in so honorable a way. He and his friends may well feel proud of it.

Mr. Richards, though defeated, had nothing to be ashamed of. He held a good vote, considering the powerful array of the younger element against him, a vote that speaks well for his personal standing in the community.

Mr. Allen, we have reason to believe, will make a good chief magistrate. At this season there are many important matters of civic concern which will engage his attention, and we have every confidence that he will approach the consideration of them from the view of the city's best interests.

The Gleaner took no part in the contest. There were no principles at stake. The matter of electing the bridge from taxation was dragged into the canvass somewhat after Mr. Allen's election became a certainty by some inflated and over-zealous persons, but as Mr. Allen's opponent was not an exceptionist, the question could not well be discussed with a view of settling it at the polls. Nor did the question have any effect on the election. In fact, neither candidate offered opposition to any of the principles which the Gleaner has all along advocated in connection with civic government, and for this reason it took no part in the contest.

Western Stage News.

The old stage teams, which the locomotive and the fair train have driven into an inglorious retirement, were many of them as fine animals as money could buy. It took a horse man to select and put them together, so they would work well, and in this regard no man ever exceeded Alex. Bennett, who was the best driver in the West. Many of these stage teams became famous all along the line for speed, endurance and all the other qualities which the boys called a "stallion team." One of the most noted of these four in hands was the "Little Brown" team. They used to run in and out of Council Bluffs, before the Northwestern road was built, and then they were sent out on the plains and gradually worked west, until they reached Laporte, where they remained until the Cheyenne route was abandoned. They were four sturdy bays of Morgan blood, medium in size and possessed of the most remarkable strength and fleetness. It was a pleasure to see them travel. The last time the writer saw them was in the summer of 1870, when they were on the line between Denver and Lake Station, then the terminus of the Kansas Pacific. They were of like color.

That this conference affirm its conviction that the duty and responsibility of the church is to stand for the maintenance of the principle of non-resistance, which is the only basis of true peace, and that it is the duty of every minister and layman to use every effort to bring about the realization of this principle in the conduct of political affairs.
