JUDGE ANNOUNCES
HIS RETIREMENT

Hon. William Wilson Retires as Judge and Court is Adjourned to April 5th

When the York County Court resumed yesterday afternoon Judge Wilson stated that since he had adjourned the court on Friday he had received a telegram from the Deputy Minister of Justice, notifying him that he had been retired from the position of County Court Judge for Quebec Superior and York counties, and in view of that he had no further duty to perform. He said he had carefully considered the matter and thought that he still had power to adjourn the court until his successor would take up his office. He would therefore adjourn the court until Tuesday, April 5th.

J. J. P. Winslow on behalf of the Bar, stated that the retirement of Judge Wilson was a surprise to him and would be to other members of the bar, and it was with feelings of regret that he saw His Honor retire after so many years of faithful service. He could say for the members of the bar that they had received every consideration from His Honor while he had been in the court, and he expressed the hope that a rest would improve His Honor's good health.

Judge Wilson stated that he had been in the position since May 1st, 1898, and had been allowed to continue his office until the coming May. He would have seen his twenty-third year as Judge of the County Court. He thanked the officers of the court for their courtesy, kindness and consideration at all times and said that while he recognized the fact that his rulings had not always met with approval, they had been received in a gentlemanly manner. He stated that he could easily recall the various sheriffs who had served during his occupancy of the judgeship—Sheriff Stirling, Sheriff Howe and Sheriff Hawthorne, the present Sheriff—and stated that he had always met with due consideration at their hands. He also thanked the constables and other officers for their respectful treatment. In closing he stated that he had had many juries summoned before him and recognized the fact that the men of the present day who came here to discharge the duties of jurors measured up to those of the past days. He stated that he wondered sometimes whether or not he had always given the right judgments, but at least he had always done what he thought was right.

Night Despatches

Montreal, March 22.—Directors of the Dominion Steel Corporation and Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Co. met here last night and agreed to form a merger with Halifax Shipyards under the name of the British Empire Steel Corporation.

Hydro Electric in Nova Scotia. Halifax, N. S., March 22.—Hon. C. T. Daniels, Attorney General, presented to the Provincial Legislature yesterday a largely signed petition from Bear River and vicinity asking for immediate consideration of the development of the water power resources of that part of Nova Scotia.

Cardinal Against Daylight Saving. Quebec, March 22.—Cardinal Beaudry has written Mayor Samson stating that the church would not alter the hour of its services even if the city adopted daylight saving.

Cannot Refloat Freighter. St. John, N. B., March 22.—Tugs failed to refloat the big freighter City of Columbus yesterday. The crew were brought ashore. It is believed the ship will be a total loss.

Cause of Train Wreck. Washington, March 22.—Failure of Engineer Long of the Michigan Central train to observe and obey certain signals was responsible for the Porter, Ind., wreck, in which 37 were killed and 2 injured, Interstate Commerce Commission's Bureau of Safety reported yesterday. A contributing cause, the report said, was the failure of Fireman Block to observe signals.

Want Pensions Increased. Ottawa, March 22.—Immediate need of increase of pensions was urged here yesterday before the Parliamentary Committee on Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment by C. G. MacNeil, Secretary Dominion Command, G.W.V.A.

Given Prison Term. Philadelphia, March 22.—Peter D. Treadway, convicted of second degree murder on Saturday for the killing of Henry T. Pierce, sales agent, here last November, was yesterday sentenced to serve from 19 to 29 years.

Two More Bodies Recovered. Chicago, March 22.—Two more bodies were taken from the debris of the elevator that was wrecked by an explosion Saturday, making the number known dead four. It is believed two more bodies are still in the wreckage.

Packers' Strike Unsettled. Washington, March 22.—After spending three and a half hours in conference with Secretaries Davis, Hoover and Wallace, representatives of the five leading packers and of their union employees, adjourned late yesterday to meet today. No statement as to progress was made.

Empire Express Hit Truck. Syracuse, N. Y., March 22.—One boy was killed, six injured, when the second Empire Express on the New York Central lines crashed into a truck carrying thirty boys at Kirkville, twelve miles east of here. They were on their way to a basketball game.

Another Irish Ambush. Dublin, March 22.—Seven members of the Crown forces, including an officer, were killed, and 13 were wounded when a train was ambushed yesterday according to official announcement. The attack occurred near Headford Jct., County Kerry.

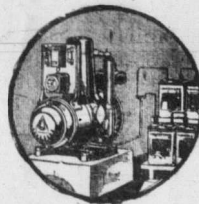
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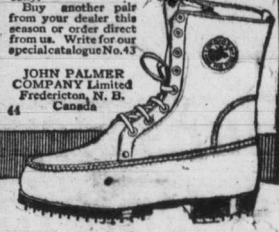
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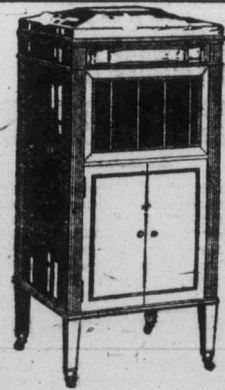
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
