There are five dwelling houses on the land. It is only a short distance to the Canada Eastern Railway, and could easily be connected with it. It is just outside the town limits, and near enough to the pumping station to get the corporation water for fire protection, and other purposes. It was here that Mayor Murdoch built a pulp mill, in his mind, and it is a good site for such a purpose. Several business men have been looking out for a chance to buy this property at a low figure, and they will all be surprised on learning that the Richards Co. has secured it. The new owners may rebuild the mill or establish some other industry there.—World.
