MAJOR BELYEA FALLS **FACING THE FOE**

Man Perishes at the Post of Duty---Memorial Service Sunday Next

was brought home to Newcastle as never before when on Thursday morning, 23rd instant, a telegram came to Mrs. Belyea, that her husband, Warren Herbert Belyea, Major and second in command of the 26th Battalion, had been killed in action in France on the 20th, thus making last and greatest possible sacrifice for his country.
