Newcastle-Chatham Curlers Will Battle Here To-morrow Evening

This will be the Greatest Sensation of the Season—Brooms to be Discarded and Baseball Bats to take Their Place. Proceeds for Hospital Drive.

Well, what next? The Miramichi has developed a craze for baseball and the latest in this sport is a friendly match between the Newcastle and Chatham Curling Clubs in the Farrell Field, Newcastle on Wednesday evening at 6:30 o'clock for the benefit of the Miramichi Hospital Extension and Nurses' Home Drive. Every organization including Firemen, Night Hawks and Royal Nine are indulging this year in the greatest game of all sports and the two curling clubs are now going to try their skill at it. It will be a great game and the spectators will have an opportunity of seeing the wielders of curling stones and brooms trying their hand with the baseball bat and sphere.

These two aggregations have often met before and many a hard fought game was played by both teams, but it was always on the ice, indoors and when the weather was at the zero mark. This time it will be something new for them and the surroundings will be quite different. Instead of ice-terra firma, outdoors instead of indoors; a hot sun instead of zero weather; a baseball bat instead of a broom, and a pill instead of a stone. How they will get along with the radical differences between the two games will be well worth seeing and it is anticipated that the largest assembly ever gathered to see a ball game will be on hand to see the members of the "Roarin' Game" take each other's measure on Wednesday evening.

The reason why the game has been called has been for the purpose of assisting the Miramichi Hospital Extension and Nurses' Home Drive which is being conducted throughout the entire county of Northumberland this week. Your attendance will assist this most worthy object, and Wednesday evening has been chosen for the time of the battle. The field should be crowded and the receipts be most satisfactory. Do not forget that you are going to be treated to a real first game of ball, played by sports of the very first water. A curler is always recognized as a good, clean sport. If he was not, he would not be a curler, because curling is a game that makes sports. President Nichol of Chatham on behalf of the Chatham Curling Club challenged the Newcastle Curling Club through President John Russell on Saturday and the Newcastle Club lost no time in accepting the challenge. Arrangements were immediately made for the big game and the members are now hard at practise. Of course, as was to be expected, a little difficulty has been experienced by some of the members during practise. When at bat, they complain that the broom is wider, which if they were allowed to use, they feel certain they would have no difficulty in making more hits, especially home runs. The in and out turns are quite similar to the in and out curve, but when it comes to the drop they are baffled. They miss the back at home plate but find the earth easy to dig up and now have several large holes around home. It is more difficult for them to hit sacrifice hits or one, two, three and home baggers than it is to draw, guard or make a tee-length, but when it comes to taking their opponent's stone out and lay, some of the members claim that it is just the same as one, two, three strikes and batter out. They find it rather awkward judging balls from strikes, as the sphere goes at a much faster rate than the curling stone does and which also is assisted by rapid sweeping. They are quite pleased to think that once the ball leaves the pitcher, there is nothing done to assist it, as in the "roarin' game" this is where they have to work. However, they are all doing well at practise and are confident they will be able to overcome these small difficulties before the day of the battle. They guarantee the best game of the season to the fans, so don't miss it, whatever you do be on hand early as it will be a fight to the finish.

DEATH SUDDENLY AT CHATHAM HEAD

Frank Kennedy, a well known resident of Chatham Head, died suddenly late Saturday night. He had been in perfect health and worked all day Saturday with the Fraser Lumber Co. On Saturday evening when through work, he put his horse in the barn and went into the house complaining of a sore throat and did not eat any supper. Later in the evening he became ill but it was impossible at the time to secure the services of a physician. Mr. Kennedy steadily became worse and died about midnight. Coroner Marven of Chatham was called and after viewing the body on Sunday refused to certify to the cause of death, stating that such could not be ascertained unless an autopsy was held. There were no marks on the body. Deceased was 35 years old and is survived by his wife, mother, three brothers and two sisters. The funeral was held this morning at 7:30 o'clock. Interment in St. Patrick's cemetery, Nelson, N. B.

CHATHAM AGAIN LEADS IN LEAGUE

Chatham again gained its place of first position in the Miramichi Baseball League when they defeated Newcastle nine to seven at Chatham on Wednesday evening. The game was witnessed by a large crowd including many from Newcastle.

In the second inning Chatham scored five men, Currie opening up the spurt by hitting a home run. In the fourth Newcastle came back strong and secured four tallies. In the fifth they got three more thus gaining the lead, but in Chatham's sixth they managed to put across four runs making a total of nine.
