All the dead, except one, were buried that evening in the cemetery of the home. graves and burying victims. The fire was discovered about midnight by Mrs. Britton, the boys' matron, who had been in bed some time when awakened by smoke. She jumped to the floor, but found it so hot she could not stand on it and immediately raised the cry of fire. Attaches hastily aroused and sent in all directions to rouse the children. Such was Mrs. Britton's anxiety for the safety of the inmates she forgot her own children, and despite the frantic efforts to rescue them they were burned to death. The fire, it is believed, originated in the room under that occupied by Mrs. Britton, where boys had cleaned out the stoves they left live coals which ignited the wood work.
