BARBARITIES AT TABRIZ.

Undisciplined Tribesmen Are Taking Part Under Shah's Sanction. St. Petersburg, July 1.—Eighty men are reported killed and many wounded in a battle yesterday at Tabriz, Persia, details of which are just received, in which it is stated that the situation continues to become more serious.

One of the prisoners just released from the royal camp describes the barbarities committed on the soldiers there. The prisoner says a church was burnt down before the eyes of prisoners who were to be released.

Housemen under Raschin Kahn are taking a leading part in the fighting at this fact is increasing the alarm of the Sultan's cabinet. The Kaiser's men are rapidly surrounding Tabriz.

They are supported by the Shah and are without discipline. The fear is general in Tabriz that the Shah will turn these riders loose in the city and the lives of all foreigners will also be endangered.
