Child's Narrow Escape

Deaf and Dumb She Stands in Centre of Car Tracks, Obnoxious of Danger From Rapidly Approaching Tram—Smart Work of Men.

About 6.30 p.m. yesterday a little girl named Boman, of Lime Street, aged 7 years, who is deaf and dumb, after leaving Mr. Barrett's shop, on New Gower Street, near Adelaide St., crossed towards the south side of the thoroughfare and reaching the centre of the street car track stood there. The child was looking west and did not see or hear street car No. 7 come over Theatre Hill and approach her at a rapid rate. The motorman as he came to the foot of the hill saw the little one and rang his gong loud and long, she, of course, did not heed it. Not aware of the child's physical disabilities the car was pretty near her when the conductor and motorman divined that she must be deaf and the brakes were put on and current reversed when the danger of running over the little one was seen. The fender struck the child and threw her but fortunately only went over her legs as she lay prone. One of her feet went up between the spaces in the bars and the men quickly extricated her. Her escape from death was narrow for had not the men checked the car so quickly she must have been cut in pieces. She received a few cuts and bruises and suffered some from shock, and after being looked after by Mrs. Barrett into whose house she was brought, she was sent to her home. Mrs. Barrett received a fright she will not soon forget. She saw from her shop window the little one on the car track with the car rapidly approaching and she was petrified with horror. When she saw that the little one was not killed she considered it almost miraculous. The child's father was lost in one of the vessels which disappeared when the Enna was lost.

Process of Making Moving Pictures.

MOVEMENTS OF VENTURES.—The S. S. Adventure does not leave for Hudson Bay to begin her charter with Revillon Freres before the 15th of June. She sails for Philadelphia the latter part of next week to load coal for this port. The Bonaventure and Belleaventure engaged for the summer by the Canadian Government for survey work, have come off dock where they were thoroughly renovated.

BOOTS AND LEATHER BURNED.—The work of clearing away the debris and getting ready to repair Parker & Monroe's Boot & Shoe Factory, began yesterday forenoon. The machinery, which is rendered useless by the fire will be quickly replaced with new and that which has been damaged will be repaired. The work will be rushed so that trade may not be impeded. About 7,000 pairs of boots were so badly damaged by fire that they must be destroyed and a good deal of the leather stock will follow suit.

BASEBALL.—The refusal of the Municipal Council for the exclusive right of a portion of the Parade Grounds has resulted in the Baseball League starting negotiations for the securing of Stancombe's Field on Freshwater Road. The grounds are now being put in condition for the season's series of games. The first game will take place between the Wanderers and Red Lion teams on June 11th. The cup donated by Mr. R. G. Reid, President of the League will be competed for by Grand Falls, Bell Island and St. John's teams.
