Certain alterations in the Rules were made at the suggestion of Vice-President Higgins.

Next Friday night, the meeting at which all crews must enter will occur in the T. A. Armory.

Mr. Coen asked that tellers be detailed to help the reporters to get the entries correctly and this was cordially granted. Each year Secretary Noonan and Mr. A. W. Williams have given the pressmen kindly and invaluable assistance, but a couple of official tellers is a boon which would be thankfully received.

Refreshments will be provided for the Committee in the C. L. B. tent and the menu as read by the President is enough to assure all that they will be well provided for.

"I will soon be an octogenarian," too," said the Cardinal, smiling, "and nature must take its course. Almighty God has blessed me with a long life and I am ready to answer whenever He sees fit to call me to render an account of my stewardship."

"I think it will not be long now," the Cardinal said, slowly, and there was no sorrow in his voice, "and when the call comes I think it will be a sudden one. We should all be ready for the call because we do not know how soon or suddenly it may come."

The visitor asked the Cardinal if he was not in good health.

"Yes," answered the Cardinal, "I still feel young and capable of performing several more years of labor, but I think it will soon pass away. Perhaps I will live ten years longer. We are never sure."
